## Helen Fitzgerald, Artist, Designed The ACWW Stamp

The Post Office issued a special stamp, Wednesday, May 13, 1959, to commemorate the Associated Country Women of the World. This is a world wide organization representing over six million rural women.

The idea of a society devoted to the betterment of rural home was conceived by Adelaide Hoodless of Hamilton, Ontario. At the invitation of Eriand Lee she organized the first Women's Institute at Stony Creek in 1897.

Mrs. Alfred Watt, M.B.E. of Ontario and British Columbia, laid the foundation for an international organization of country women and was elected president of the Associated Country Women of the World in Stockholm, Sweden, in 1933.

The green, black and white

stamp was designed by Helen Fitzgerald, a Toronto artist, and shows a female figure kneeling beside a tree over which the globe is poised. The words Associated Country Women of the World in English and French are along the borders. The design symbolizes growth, as cultivated by country women of individual country organizations, into the world association as represented by the globe.

Postmaster-General W.M. Hamilton, in announcing the new stamp said, "The basic unit of a nation, and in fact of civilization is the home. By strengthening it, the followers of Mrs. Hoodless, Mrs. Watt and similar pioneer women in the other countries of the world, are building a better future for all people."
