

# Discuss Possibility Of Auditorium, Art Centre

Representatives of cultural organizations and service clubs met last night at the Clover Club to discuss ways and means of having a civic auditorium and art centre erected on the site of the destroyed Charlottetown City Market. It was not a general meeting and those attending were there by invitation.

The objective of the gathering was to sound out the amount of support which could be rallied behind the project and later call a general meeting of citizens.

Mr. Barry Bugden, known to many Islanders for his interest and participation in amateur theatricals, was named chairman of the meeting. Such organizations as the Art Society of Prince Edward Island, the Little Theatre Guild, the Business and Professional Women's Club, the Kinsmen, the Camera Club, the Provincial Drama Association, the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion, and other community-minded organizations had delegates present.

Mrs. Bayfield Ellis of the Art Society, who has been doing much of the ground work towards unifying the various organizations, which hope to see the centre become a reality, outlined the purpose of the meeting.

Mrs. Helen Dunbar of the Business and Professional Women's Club, expressed the interest of the club's membership. Speaking for the Canadian Legion.

Mr. J. B. Murley said that he had been instructed by the President of the Legion, Mr. Leard, to say that the veterans were very much behind the movement.

Delegates from the Kinsmen, the Camera Club, the Little Theatre Guild, presented their ideas, and the discussion throughout was crisp and enthusiastic.

A resolutions committee was appointed with Mrs. Bayfield Ellis as chairman. One delegate from each of the organizations present was to constitute the full committee. At a later date the

Resolutions Committee, after reporting back to their various clubs and associations, will meet to frame a general resolution to be presented to the Provincial Government, and to such other authorities as deemed necessary. It was the sense of the meeting that support might be expected from the Dominion Government, and that sympathetic consideration could be expected from the Provincial Government and the City Council.

It was pointed out by the Canadian Legion delegate that many cities across Canada had presented the Legion with building sites, and that such a gift would involve no expense on the part of the donor.

Those attending the meeting were greatly encouraged, and it was decided to advertise the holding of a general meeting, open to all citizens and organizations some time in early June.

A resolution thanking the Canadian Legion for the use of the Clover Club was passed.

**PASTURE FERTILIZATION**

A frequent mistake is the notion that pastures and hay fields need little fertilizer. This is a bad mistake. Not only do they need lots of fertilizer, but they may grow three or four crops a year and, therefore, need three or four times as much fertilizer as the field which produces only one.

Using clovers and alfalfa mixed with grasses is an excellent practice, but clovers and alfalfa are also very heavy feeders and, except for nitrogen, must also be adequately fed. Grasses and clovers grown together properly managed and fed, can most significantly increase soil production potential. When incorporated in the rotation, the sod crop can do more than any other crop to maintain the soil for present production as well as build for the future.

Here are the recommendations for grassland in Prince Edward Island:

Limestone—Best results are obtained from frequent light applications, say 800 to 1000 lbs. every three years worked into the soil.

Manure—Fall or spring applications at the rate of 10 tons every three or four years.

**MARKED INCREASE**

The number of cattle bred artificially on Prince Edward Island during the first four months of this year has shown a marked increase over the corresponding period of last year. To date just under two thousand cattle have been bred artificially from January to the end of April. In the month of April this year 654 cattle bred so far in the month of May have also shown a marked increase over the same period last year.

The busy breeding season is now close at hand, the number of calls the inseminators will receive will increase to a point where they have to work extremely long hours in order to extend the service to their members. This work can greatly be facilitated by the cooperation of all members. Make sure that your calls are in by ten o'clock in the morning for service that day. This not only works in the inseminators' interest but also in the breeders' interest because the fact that the marked difference between artificial and natural breeding is the time of breeding. In artificial breeding far better results are obtained by breeding
