A Few Figures.—The amount of Canadian inland revenue accrued in August was \$651,383, as compared with \$645,993 for the same month last year. Deposits in the post office savings bank during August were \$657,654 and withdrawals \$512,916, balance a credit of depositors \$27,175,555.

A Important Suit.—The suit of Messrs. Connolly, at Kingston, against the city of St. John to recover \$44,000 on the contract for building wharves in 1893 and 1894 and for \$22,234 more for extra towage and dredging, was commenced at St. John on Friday. The city denies the Connolly's right of action, claiming that they have fully paid.

Accident.—A young man named John Trainor, in the employment of Charles McGregor, carpenter, while at work on the new St. James' Hall yesterday afternoon fell to the ground, a distance of about 20 feet. He was promptly removed to his home, and medical aid summoned. It was at first thought he was injured internally, but to-day he is reported all right, except for a few bruises and a general shaking up.

Another Record Smashed.—Another record has been broken in the United States. Judge Reed, Wichita, Ks., recently rushed through all the proceedings connected with a divorce case in 10m 2s. The best time previous to this achievement stood to the credit of Judge Jennings, of Woodward, Oklahoma, whose figure was 19m 45s. In each dignity and decency were distanced.

Some Wholesome Suggestions.—The Chicago Times Herald feels called upon to call the attention of the members of the Chicago city council to the utility of cupboards; to the floor rather than the tops of desks as the appropriate place for one's feet; to the folly of throwing paper wads at each other, and to the propriety of wearing the clothes they bring with them to the city council chamber instead of sitting in their shirt sleeves. These suggestions seem to be in the line of public economy, but the pity of it is they appear to be necessary.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Sept. 24.—The New York Central has again broken the record for fast time. This morning a special, consisting of three coaches, and drawn by No. 999, left Albany at 6 o'clock and arrived here at 8:12, making the run of 148 miles in 132 minutes. This beats the world's record for this distance.

OLDTOWN, Maine, Sept. 24.—Extensive forest fires are reported from the districts north, of here, in spite of all efforts to check their progress. The village of Oldtown, 10 miles distant, is threatened, and the residents are preparing to move if efforts to quench the flames are not successful within a few hours.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 24.—It is reported here that China has rejected a British demand for the banishment of the ex-viceroy of Szechuen. An imperial decree which has been issued, appoints Li Hung Changland all the members of the Yung Li Yamien to formulate an extra treaty between China and Japan.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 24.—It is learned tonight that the government of Premier Greenway intend bringing on the provincial general elections almost at once. The appeal to the people will be made on the government's refusal to modify their position on the school question.

St. Johns, Nfld., Sept. 24.—The Peary expedition and its doings continue to prove a fertile source of gossip. The newspapers give copious accounts of the journey and the ice capital, the sufferings of the party and other essential particulars. Most persons here think Peary was very imprudent in undertaking such a journey at all, as he found his footcaches were lost. Prof. Salisbury, one of the relief party, started for home yesterday, via Sydney, Cape Breton. He was given passage by the cable ss. Minia. The other members of the party go by the steamer Silvia, leaving to-morrow at midnight. The steamer Kite has been visited by thousands of persons during the past three days.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 24.—The entire province of Ch. Kiang has again been placarded with anti-foreign and anti-Christian proclamations, causing not a little anxiety among foreign residents.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Sept. 23.—A special from Rawlins, Wyoming, says: Frank Nevis sent his two sons in a o the Gulch, a mile away from home, to drive cows. Twenty horsemen who went to search for them have returned without finding trace of them. They have undoubtedly perished in the snow, which is two feet deep. The Snake River stage picked up a sheep herder last night. He was completely exhausted and almost dead.

LONDON, Sept. 24.—Sir Herbert Murray, who in March last was appointed to Newfoundland for the purpose of distributing the financial assistance to the colony which had been voted by parliament, was to-day appointed to the governorship of Newfoundland.

They were well strung out in this order until the quarter was over, when Onca put on a splendid burst of speed, and as they passed under the wire she was almost neck and neck with Bonnie F.
