Inspection Scheduled For Propellers of Ferry

Divers were scheduled to inspect the propellers of the ferry MV Abegweit for loose nuts when she arrived at Terminous early this morning. Extremely heavy ice on the Terminous side made fairly slow going for the ferry on her last trip. She left Borden at 11:15 a.m. and arrived at the mainland terminal at 12:45 a.m. today. The ferry was tied-up for a little over 16 hours Monday while divers lightened 1,000 nuts on her propellers and repaired a cracked cylinder on one of her engines. The inspection was scheduled to be made at Borden when she arrived there at 11:15 p.m. but it was decided that additional equipment was available at Terminous and while traffic was cleared at Borden on the 10:18 trip. The Borden train arrived in the city at approximately 11:30 a.m. The heavy ice conditions forced the Canadian National Railways to adjust the schedule of the ferry. It was announced last night that Eric P. Stephenson, manager of the Maritime area, Montreal, will not be notified. The ship will leave Borden at 10:05 a.m. rather than 12:25 a.m. and will begin her return trip on Cape Tormentine at 11:30 a.m. rather than 1:30 a.m. The ship will follow the schedule otherwise. Mr. Stephenson said passengers, trucks and autos will be handled on all extra, unscheduled crossings to be made at Terminous on the "gas" trips.
