OTTAWA. — (Special) — Fish from the Atlantic Provinces, including substantial quantities from Prince Edward Island, continue to find their way into the Dominican Republic market. J. J. B. Mine Fund Drive Hits \$3,500 Mark

With returns complete from four groups of canvassers the house-to-house canvass for the Springhill Relief Fund sponsored by a number of Charlottetown organizations reached a total of more than \$3,500 last night. Clive Gudmore, president of the Kinsmen Club, expressed belief that the final total will exceed \$5,000 when complete figures have been compiled. Mr. Gudmore said that he doesn't expect a final total before Monday. Reason for the delay, he said, is that many of the canvassers were asked to call back to homes for donations and this part of the canvass is expected to be cleared up over the weekend. The campaign was enriched by a \$10 donation from a resident of Holland yesterday. The donation was made by John C. Bulk who read about the nation-wide drive for funds and the disaster in one of his homeland papers. Mr. Bulk sent the cheque to Bob Szazelle, manager of the Cotton Memorial Nurseries of Lunenburg, with an accompanying note reading in part, "We Dutchmen know from experience the boundless generosity of Canadians." The cheque was enclosed on a request for a shipment of tulips. The nursery manager turned it over to Mr. Gudmore.

Eight Life Insurance Men Continue Special Studies

Eight Prince Edward Island life insurance men began the second year of a special two year course yesterday sponsored by the Life Underwriters Association of Canada in cooperation with a number of insurance companies. The chairman of the study group, R.J. Rupert, C.L.U., said last night that the men who had successfully completed the first year were now continuing with the second and final year, were highly enthusiastic about the progress made in keeping up-to-date on sales methods and economic trends. The present year's course includes the study of problems of business ownership, estate creation, conservation and distribution. "The good insurance man," said Mr. Rupert, "has a professional status and like a good doctor, dentist or accountant, must constantly read and study so that he may adequately deal with the life insurance needs and problems of his clients." The first year course was begun in October 1957, with the present Lieutenant Governor, F. Walter Hyndman as moderator. R.E. Younker, C.L.U., is acting as vice-moderator for the present course. Ch'town Credit Union Ltd. Reports New High In Assets

Assets of the Charlottetown Credit Union Limited were announced at an all-time high of \$45,394.12 at the annual meeting of the union held Thursday evening. President J.J. MacIsaac in his report to the Board of Directors said that increased saving of over \$10,000 brought the figure to its record level. It was reported that 103 loans totalling \$27,000 were made to members during the year and that 61 new members had joined the union since the last annual meeting. The president expressed a hope that credit union benefits would be greatly extended to many new members in the forthcoming year. Mr. MacIsaac suggested that a goal of \$60,000 in assets as a challenge to the membership to 1959.

3 Accidents In City Last Night

Both vehicles received extensive damage. Approximately a half-hour later a car travelling west on Kent Street was in collision with a second vehicle also travelling west on Kent Street.

Crapaud Polio Inoculations End Year's Rural Clinics

With the return clinic in Crapaud on Thursday, November 6th, when inoculations of protective Salk Vaccine were administered the scheduled rural adult polio clinics for this year came to a conclusion. The larger centres throughout the province were covered, with first and second clinics being held in each place. The rural clinics will resume next summer, when third inoculations are due. They will be carried out on precisely the same schedule as they have been this year. The response from the people in the rural areas has been most satisfactory, project official report. The project is still in operation in Charlottetown. Another major clinic is scheduled for Wednesday, November 12th, at the Community Centre from 5.30 to 9 p.m. This clinic is organized for the purpose of administering third inoculations to city individuals. There is still a large number of third shots outstanding, people who have not as yet come forward for their final dose of the protective vaccine. It is of utmost importance that the series be completed in order to give the individual full protection. Project officials state that there is still considerable demand from people desiring to start the series. Those wishing to get a first inoculation are urgently requested to attend. Clinics will continue at intervals in the city as long as there is demand and response. It is expected that one more clinic will be
