**Claims Evidence Strong Against Cigaret Smoking**

WASHINGTON (AP)—A spokesman for the American Cancer Society told Congress today that in his opinion "the evidence is overwhelming" that cigarette smoking leads to lung cancer.

Dr. E. Cuyler Hammond also testified that cigarette smoking appears to increase the likelihood of heart and arterial disease and said further the evidence would seem to give pipe and cigar smokers a better life expectancy than cigarette users.

Dr. Hammond prepared his testimony for a house of government operations subcommittee starting an investigation of advertising claims as to the protective value of filters on cigarettes. He did not discuss filters.

Much of what Dr. Hammond said was based on a publicized report that he and Dr. Daniel Horn made last month to the American Medical Association.

Before the hearings started, chairman John Blatnik (Dem. Minn.) told reporters that cigarette manufacturers may be "kidding" smokers about the effectiveness of filters.

**ABSTAINER DEATHS LOW**

Dr. Hammond reported in these words on an American Cancer Society study of cigarette smoking: "We found lung cancer death rates to be extremely low among non-smokers and high among heavy cigarette smokers, the rates increasing with the amount of cigarette smoking."

"In my opinion the evidence is overwhelming that cigarette smoking is a causative factor of great importance in the occurrence of lung cancer. This does not imply that smoking is the only cause of lung cancer."

Dr. Hammond likewise testified that he was of the opinion that "cigarette smoking causes an increase in the death rate from coronary artery disease."

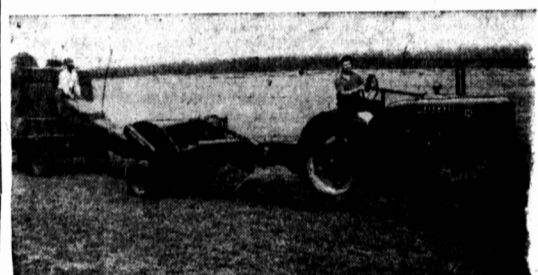
