

The Kidnappers Caught.

A telegram from Montreal describes the arrest of the Deal brothers, who are charged with kidnaping Mr. Jaffray, of Toronto, and who had designs against Hon. George Brown and Hon. Oliver Mowatt, Premier of Ontario. According to the despatch the Deals belong to a kidnaping league, who proposed to operate in Ontario.

MONTREAL, Sept. 13.—To-day Detectives Cullen and Murphy, who were on the look out at the Grand Trunk Station, arrested two young men about twenty years of age, who answered the description of the Deals in the Jaffray kidnaping case, Toronto. They first gave their names as Ross, but subsequently confessed their names were John and Thomas Deal. A book found on them showed they belonged to a Kidnaping Association called the Canadian League, which seems to have made arrangements to operate in Hamilton, St. Catharines, Guelph, London, Brantford and Toronto. The book also contains names of other members, a secret alphabet and extracts from a constitution which binds the members to obey the orders of the officers. John Shilitos, the Cincinnati merchant who died lately, aged sixty years, began life as a poor man, and died worth \$3,000,000.

The Western Union Telegraph Company has formally declared a quarterly dividend at 1 1/2 per cent., after paying which leaves a balance of profit on the quarter of over a million dollars.

Lieutenant Carey is going to sue the Paris Figaro, which said that he, being a sworn Communist and hater of Imperialism, manoeuvred so as to lead the Prince Imperial into danger and then deserted him.

Mary Smith, alias Helen Miller, alias Elizabeth Munker, is 35 years of age and had \$1,800 in bank. Her peculiarity is a mania for stealing surgical instruments. Since 1869 she has robbed about thirty physicians. Whether she is a kleptomaniac or a professional thief is the puzzle.

John Lind, fourteen years old, of Greenfield, Pa., ran away from home on Tuesday. He stepped from a passenger train at Green Ridge next day, in front of a coal train, and was run over and instantly killed.

Capt. Vernon Chater, of the Ninety-first Highlanders, who vacated his appointment as A. D. C. to the Marquis of Lorne in order to join his regiment in Zululand, is to resume his position in Canada.

Mr. John Ryan, the contractor for the 100 miles of railway from Winnipeg west, expects to have 500 men at work at an early date, and, in accordance with instructions from the Government, will push on the work with great vigor.

Miss Fletcher, the author of "Kismet" is twenty three years of age. She lives in Rome, dresses well, and wears blonde hair. Her nom de plume is "George Fleming," and her friends call her "George." She makes lots of money.

The Pope has written an autograph letter to the Emperor William, summing up the results of the late negotiations between the Vatican and Germany, and suggesting the Emperor's direct intervention, in the way of clemency, as the only way to re-establish harmony. It is reported that Prince Bismark knew and approved of this step beforehand.

Two trains on the third avenue elevated railroad in New York came into collision on the 10th inst., owing to a misplaced switch. The trains were moving slowly from the depot at the same time, and going in different directions, and the engines crashed together before they could be stopped. No person was injured, but the engines were badly wrecked. The switchman fled, and has not since been seen.

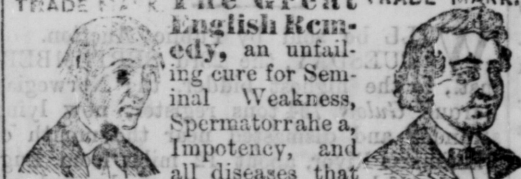
