THE NEW TARIFF.

It has been stated, over and over again, by the Opposition and their organs, that the new tariff gives no relief to our farmers or the public at large. We are glad to note that a distinct and categorical answer to this statement has been made. It appears that no less than seventy-one articles are absolutely free under the new tariff which were dutiable under the old, and that ten other articles are unconditionally free now which previously were only conditionally free. Among the articles made free are hubs for wheels, etc., lathes, pickets, shingles, fertilizers, Bibles, prayer books, hymn books, psalm books, coke (of great importance in cheapening manufactures), smelting machinery, lumber (dressed on one side or undressed), olive oil for making soap, canning fish, etc.; globes for schools, sugar of lead, flax fibre, marble in the rough, books for mechanics' institutes libraries, besides a number of raw materials used in manufactures tending to cheapen the cost to consumers. We quote the list of articles in respect to which reductions have been effected:—

Agricultural implements, mowers, reapers, binders, and all sorts of such implements used by the farmer, have been reduced from 35 per cent. to 20 per cent. Pumps of all kinds reduced from 35 per cent. to 30 per cent. Barbed wire fencing reduced from 15 cents per lb. to 1 cent per lb. Buckhorn and strip fencing reduced from 14 cents to 5 cent per lb. Woolen goods were 10 cents per lb. and 20 per cent.; reduced to 5 cents per lb. and 25 per cent. Duties on cottons of every description ranged from 40 per cent. to 60 per cent. in old tariff, now average 25 per cent.—a very material reduction.

Falls, tubs, brooms, wash-boards, etc., reduced from 25 per cent. to 20 per cent. Farm waggons that were from \$10 to \$15 specified, and 20 per cent., are under the new tariff only 25 per cent. all told. Buggies, carriages, etc., old tariff \$10 to \$15 each specific and 20 per cent.; reduced to \$5 each and 20 per cent. Cabinet organs, \$10, \$15 and \$20 specific and 15 per cent. in old tariff; in new, all reduced to 35 per cent. Powder reduced one half. Tanned paper, old tariff, 1 cent per lb., now 25 per cent. only. Starch and corn starch, old rate, 2 cts. per lb.; new rate 1 ct. per lb. White and common soap, reduced from duty of 1 1/2 cts. up to 1 ct. per lb. Canned tomatoes, vegetables, old tariff, 3 cts. per lb.; new, 1 1/2 cts. per lb. Cloths of all kinds reduced from 35 per cent. to 25 per cent. Furniture, reduced from 35 per cent. to 30 per cent. Coffins, caskets, etc., reduced from 35 per cent. to 25 per cent. Stamped tinware and galvanized ironware, from 35 per cent. to 25 per cent. Bells, reduced from 30 per cent. to 25 per cent. Spades and shovels, old tariff, \$1 per dozen and 25 per cent.; new tariff, 50 cts. per dozen and 25 per cent. Saws, etc., reduced from \$2 per doz. and 10 per cent. to 35 per doz. Axes, which were \$2.40 per dozen, specific, are now 35 per cent. only. Sewing machines, which were \$3 each and 10 per cent., are now only 30 per cent. In sythes, axes, spades and shovels, and sewing machines, the change from the specific to the ad valorem is a great reduction. Clothes wringers, in old, \$1 each and 30 per cent.; in new, 25 cents each and 20 per cent. Cut nails reduced from 1 cent per lb. to 1,000 to 1 1/2 cents per 1,000. About \$10 per ton is taken off axles, springs, etc. Wire nails reduced from 1 1/2 cents per pound to 1 cent per pound. Harness and saddlery reduced from 35 per cent. to 30 per cent. Belting reduced from 25 per cent. to 15 per cent. Putty reduced from 25 per cent. to 15 per cent. Turpentine reduced from 10 per cent. to 5 per cent. Paints reduced from 3 cents per pound and 25 per cent. to 25 per cent. only. Blasting reduced from 30 per cent. to 20 per cent. Ink reduced from 25 per cent. to 20 per cent. Shoelacking reduced from 30 per cent. to 20 per cent. Linseed oil, important in a great number of manufactures, old tariff 1 1/2 cts. per lb., new tariff 20 per cent. only. This reduction will reduce prices of many manufactured articles to the consumer.

Essential oils, old, 20 per cent.; new, only 20 per cent. Coal oil, reduced from 7 1/2 cents per gallon to 6 cents; and other concessions made which have enabled retailers to greatly reduce the price of Canadian coal oil. Sugar in old tariff, up to and including No. 14, was free; new tariff makes up to and including No. 16 free. Thus most of the bright sugars are made free. Duty on granulated sugar is reduced from 8-10th of a cent. to 64-100 per lb. In the face of these numerous additions to the Free List, and these material reductions of the tariff, the Grits have had the hardihood to iterate and reiterate the falsehood that the tariff is practically unchanged. We ask the people of this Province to note the facts here stated.

CHURCH OF ENGLAND SYNOD. The Status of P. E. Island. Movement Towards a New Diocese. HALIFAX, June 27. At the Synod yesterday, Dean Gilpin reported for the committee on the status of P. E. Island and the Synod of Nova Scotia. He submitted the following report which took the form of a resolution, which was adopted:—

TELEGRAPHIC. SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. THE ONTARIO ELECTIONS. Mowat's Majority is Greatly Reduced. The Cities Against the Grits.

TORONTO, June 27. At midnight the result of the elections appears to have enabled Sir Oliver Mowat to continue to cling to office, but only just by the skin of his teeth. It was a fierce fight and Sir Oliver has had the closest call of his political life. His Parliamentary majority of 25 is reduced by 50 per cent. In Toronto, the commercial, financial and intelligent metropolis, all four Conservative candidates are elected by majorities ranging from 850 to 3000. No more humiliating condemnation could be meted out to any man than has been meted out to Sir Oliver's government by the people of Toronto.

Mr. Meredith, the Conservative leader is triumphantly re-elected in London, while the Provincial Treasurer, Hon. Mr. Harty, is defeated in Kingston. The Empire announces the result as follows: The whole number of members is 94; Liberals elected, 47; Opposition, 43; constituencies to hear from, 4.

The Globe, on the other hand, sets up a claim of a Liberal majority of 12 or 14, which is just half what Mowat had in the last house; but in its detailed figures the Globe gives the following returns: The whole number of members, 94; Liberals, 49; Conservatives, 25; Patrons of Industry, 15; Protestant Protective Association; 3; Constituencies to hear from, 2; Sir Oliver himself is elected by about 500 majority.
