Mr. Pickerskill said in a statement that Canada will use the station to participate in the testing of experimental communications satellites launched by the United States National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

WASHINGTON (AP) — State Secretary Dean Rusk said Friday some Cuban broadcasts suggest the Castro government is building up a concerted campaign to get the United States out of the Guantanamo naval base. Rusk told a press conference the U.S. is in Guantanamo and "we shall remain there for the foreseeable future." Rusk rejected as "inadmissible" Cuban claims that the U.S. seizure of fishing vessels and crew members violated the violation of U.S. territorial waters of Florida. The secretary said that two of the fishing boat captains had admitted to U.S. authorities that they knew they were in U.S. territorial waters. He said the Havana government also knew this from radio communications with the fishing boats. Rusk did not spell out what he considered indications that the Cubans are developing a concerted campaign "against our position in Guantanamo," but he declared that authorities here have noted Cuban broadcasts that seem to have that meaning.

Cuba Planning To Claim Base

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Cuban President Osvaldo Dorticos said Friday night his government will lay claim to the U.S. naval base at Guantanamo "at a time in a statement broadcast by Havana Radio monitored in Miami, Dorticos said. "We will claim the base in the moment we consider convenient and will use the way of international organizations that we will consider convenient for our claim." He said he was making the statement in rebuttal to a statement from U.S. State Secretary Dean Rusk that "we are making a premeditated campaign to expel the United States from Guantanamo."

"We also hope to get zoom lenses for closeup work and floodlighting equipment for use in poor light conditions," he said.

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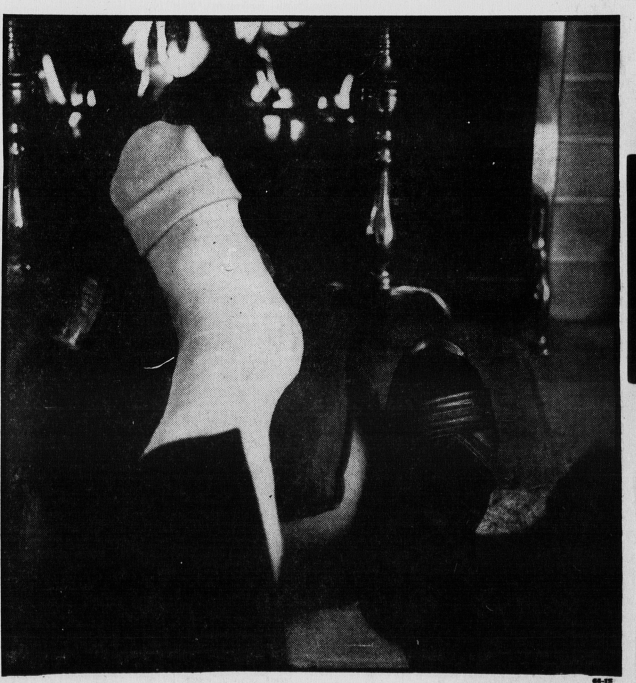
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
