

MANSLAUGHTER CASE HEARD IN SUPREME COURT

Russell Abbott of Charlottetown was on trial in Supreme Court yesterday charged with manslaughter. After evidence for the Crown had been completed, the Court adjourned until 10:30 this morning when defense witnesses will be heard.

Summary of Evidence

A summary of evidence submitted to the Crown yesterday follows: Dr. F. W. Tidmarsh, Charlottetown, medical practitioner, testified on April 11, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 1936, that he was called to the scene of the accident on the night of April 20, 1936, at 8 o'clock.

Richard Dougan, locomotive engineer and fireman, testified he was firing a switcher that night in the Charlottetown yards. At the time of the accident they were backing out, running tender first on the eastern track. They had the engine under the tender.

When the train stopped the end of the tender was just over the crossing. The car hit the tender about 12 or 15 feet after they hit it. It rolled over between the tracks and dropped off on the town side.

When the Court resumed at 2:30 Mr. Reardon was recalled to give additional measurements he had made at the Grafton Street crossing.

Island Hospital after the accident. She talked to the witness, and appeared to be suffering. The witness was with her daughter the next day from 5 o'clock in the morning until she died that evening at 8 o'clock.

Charles Coyle, locomotive engineer who was driving the switcher on the night of April 20 was the next witness. He was on the City side as they crossed Grafton St. at the time of the accident.

William Jay, C.N.R. yard foreman in Charlottetown, said he was on the rear of the car loaded with automobiles when they approached the crossing on the night of April 20, 1936.

Benjamin McEachern, Charlottetown police officer, told of getting a call to Grafton St. crossing on the night of April 20. He was accompanied by Constable Jay. They saw a woman lying on the veranda of Davis & Fraser's warehouse.

C. Clark Gratto, electrical and signal maintainer, of Truro, told that he was stationed in Charlottetown at the time of the accident. He inspected the Grafton St. signal and lights on the 21st of April and found them in perfect condition.

Henry Douglas, C.N.R. trainman was on the pilot of the engine. He helped carry Mrs. Johnson to the car.
