

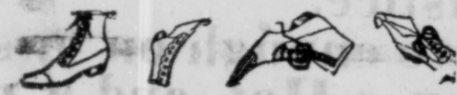

TOURNAMENT TROPHIES.—In Mr. L. W. Cook's window are the prizes for the events in the military tournament. Besides there are a great number of medals.
