### NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

#### THE SITUATION.

From the Daily Patriot.

St. PETERSBURG, April 22.

The principle of simultaneous withdrawal  
of the Russian and English forces from the  
neighborhood of Constantinople has been  
accepted; but as soon as the application  
came to be discussed, the Russians think  
that if the British fleet retires to Besika  
Bay, they ought to withdraw only a day's  
march. The English maintain that they  
ought to withdraw to Adrianople—24 hours  
by railway from Constantinople.

It is also feared that the Porte may take  
the advantage, in the absence of foreign  
forces, to increase their land fortifications  
or close the Dardanelles, according as Rus-  
sian or British interest predominates.

The equipment of the Russian Baltic fleet  
is proceeding with all haste, in order that  
they may be sent to sea as soon as the ice  
breaks. It consists of seven vessels.

LONDON, April 22.

A peaceful solution of the Eastern Ques-  
tion is becoming hopeless.

Five batteries of artillery are now at  
Woolwich to proceed to Malta.

A gunboat flotilla is to be prepared im-  
mediately for the defence of the British coast.

The number of men belonging to the  
army reserve who have joined their colors is  
very satisfactory. The number of absen-  
tees averages less than five per cent.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 22.

Layard has taken steps to put the British  
subjects under the protection of the Am-  
erican Minister, the latter having asked the  
consent of his Government.

CALCUTTA, April 22.

The native regiments have been ordered  
to recruit to their full war strength im-  
mediately.

Factories for the manufacture of arms and  
ammunition are working day and night.

Sepoys responded cheerfully to the sum-  
mons for foreign service and a number of  
regiments spontaneously volunteered.

NEW YORK, April 22.

William Orton, President of the Western  
Union Telegraph Co., died this morning,  
from apoplexy. He attended church yester-  
day.

#### Sons of Temperance.

The following report was submitted by  
the G. W. P. at the Quarterly Session on  
the 18th April, and there recommended for  
publication:—

To the Grand Division of the Sons of Tem-  
perance of Prince Edward Island:

OFFICERS AND REPRESENTATIVES.— In  
presenting this, my second quarterly report,  
I am glad to congratulate you on the very  
large attendance of representatives present  
to-day; and, assembled as we are, in the  
neat and commodious Hall of Triumph  
Division No. 63, I trust our meeting to-  
gether will be productive of much good to  
each division here represented. There is  
much business to come before you to-day,  
and some business of importance. You  
will find in the reports of the Grand Scribe  
and Grand Treasurer the statistics of the  
Order for the past quarter.

I am glad to be able to report that, since  
we last met, I have visited officially every  
subordinate Division on the Island. Feb.  
27th, visited "Union," No. 45; this is  
one of our largest Divisions, and is doing  
well. March 4th, Prince William, No. 46;  
this is also doing well. March 6th, Gran-  
ville, No. 52; this Division is steadily ad-  
vancing. March 18th, Forest Home, No.  
93; a fair meeting, although a very stormy  
night. March 19th, Prince of Wales, No.  
33; they have gone to work afresh, and  
are steadily progressing. March 20th,  
Triumph, No. 63, very good attendance.  
March 21st, New Glasgow, No. 56; this  
Division is doing well. March 22nd, Ark  
of Safety, No. 57; very large and interest-  
ing meeting. March 26th, Y. M. C. A.,  
No. 102; this was the only meeting of the  
quarter. March 28th, Northern Light, No.  
103; very good meeting. April 1st, Victo-  
ria, No. 4; good meeting, and installed  
the officers. April 2nd, Blooming Hope,  
No. 86; installed officers—fair attendance.  
April 3rd, Prince Edward, No. 1; not  
large attendance—installed the officers.  
April 11, Warren Grove, No. 101; this  
Division has again taken a fresh start.  
April 15, Diamond of the Desert, No. 9;  
this Division is steadily increasing. Took  
part in an initiation and installed the  
officers.

I am glad to report two old Divisions re-  
organized; March 1st, Rising Star, No. 61,  
Park Corner, with 30 members; and March  
27th, Crystal Spring, No. 88, Hazel Grove,  
45 members.

Besides these, three new Divisions have  
been established and added to the Roll.  
March 11th, Mayflower, 104, South Rustico,  
with 30 Charter members. I visited this  
Division again on April 8, and found them  
doing well. April 9, Caledonia, No. 105,  
Hopdale, with 32 charter members. Apr. 1  
16, Dauntless, No. 106, Morell, with 19  
charter members. This will make a total  
of 20 Divisions on the Roll at the present  
date.

I have been called upon to address eight  
public temperance meetings during the  
quarter.

The necessity for a qualified agent for  
this Grand Division—must now, I think, be

apparent. I invite your earnest considera-  
tion to the matter at this time, and refer  
you to the correspondence relating thereto.

You will also find on file a letter from  
John B. Gough, in which his contemplated  
visit to the Island is deferred until his re-  
turn from England. The file of correspon-  
dence will be laid before you.

Believing that a grand demonstration of  
Sons of Temperance under the auspices of  
this grand body during the coming summer,  
in which all the various divisions on the  
Island may take part, would tend materially  
to advance the interests of the Order and  
the cause, I most cheerfully submit the  
matter for your consideration.

In the question of prohibition we are  
glad to find that many men of both polit-  
ical parties in the Dominion Legislature are  
warmly supporting the Temperance Bill  
now under consideration. We anticipate  
its adoption by both the Senate and Com-  
mons. As Sons of Temperance we have  
adopted the prohibition platform and in-  
tend to stand squarely on it. Prohibition  
does prohibit. General Neal Dow, refer-  
ring recently to the Maine Liquor Law,  
says, "We have not an open rum shop  
now, except a few low dens where liquor is  
sold with the utmost secrecy and caution,  
and on a very small scale. We have now  
24 rum-sellers in jail, one for over a year.  
Maine saves by the Law \$20,000,000 a year,  
which otherwise would be spent and lost by  
the liquor traffic. Both parties in Maine  
endorse prohibition and the enforcement of  
the Law."

I have to respectfully request the Deputy  
of each subordinate division on the Island  
to read in open division, at the earliest  
meeting, the commission containing the  
powers and duties of the Deputy G. W. P.  
I also request the Deputies and W. Patri-  
archs of each division to take a more gen-  
eral oversight of the division; see that the  
division room is at all times well and pro-  
perly lighted and fitted up neatly, and  
made in every way worthy of the Order.

Brothers, in returning to our respective  
divisions, let us go back inspired with new  
life and zeal. Our Order is steadily march-  
ing on. Our recent successes have inspired  
confidence in the public that there is stabili-  
ty in the Order of the Sons of Temperance.  
Our flag has been waving in the  
breeze for upwards of thirty-five years.  
For more than twenty-nine years it has  
been unfurled in this, the garden of Am-  
erica. It is a time-honored flag, and as true  
Sons of Temperance we will guard it from  
dishonor.

Officers and representative, I cannot close  
this hurriedly-written report without duly  
acknowledging the kindness, respect, and  
courtesy everywhere extended to me as  
your chief executive officer. I have always  
received a brother's hand and a brother's  
welcome.

And now, in again welcoming you to  
Grand Division, I invite your close atten-  
tion to the business of the session.

Sir John McDonald Villified.

The base and false reports respecting the  
conduct of Sir John McDonald during the  
recent disgraceful "Parliamentary spree"  
are receding upon the heads of those who  
circulated them. They are condemned by  
every man of good feeling. The Toronto  
Mail says: "The paragraph in which the  
writer speaks of the demeanour of Sir John  
McDonald is the foul concoction of a literary  
ghoul. Sir John McDonald is sixty-three  
years of age. He made a speech at the  
opening of the debate of three hours' dura-  
tion which no other man in Canada could  
have made, having regard to the intellectual  
power displayed, and which few could have  
gone through with the same freshness. He  
sat through that long sitting until eight  
o'clock on Saturday morning, directing the  
debate. Those who took the trouble to  
read the report will have seen that he was  
the whole time on the *qui vive*. Yet, blind  
with fury and impelled by desperation, the  
*Globe* seeks to poison the public mind  
against the statesman who, though old and  
spent with long labors in his country's ser-  
vice, stood at his post with a noble and  
touching fidelity and pluck, fighting the bat-  
tle of right against wrong, of liberty against  
tyranny, of the constitution against a resur-  
rected prerogative."

taken up this subject with a determination  
not to let it drop, till the rascalities of the  
Government press are fully exposed, till all  
men, (and especially Temperance men,  
whose minds it is sought to poison against  
Sir John), are convinced that Sir John is  
the victim of a most despicable conspiracy,  
which will not scruple to resort to the vilest  
and most unfounded statements to accom-  
plish their nefarious ends. In the long run  
we are confident that the indignation of  
true Sons and Daughters of Temperance  
will be turned against the men who would  
destroy a gifted man who has, by the aid  
of his faithful wife, so gallantly breasted  
the waves of an affliction—the intensity and  
strength of which none know better than  
Temperance men and women."
