Egyptian News.

CAIRO, Aug. 20. Col. Kitchener telegraphs the Mahdi's lieutenant, El Hoda, has attacked and defeated friendly tribes at Meraw; that corpses of those killed by the enemy, with hands tied behind their backs, have been floating down the Nile past Debbeh, and that El Hoda is advancing to effect a junction with the other rebels. The despatch states El Hoda is only three days distant from Debbeh. The Nile is falling steadily several inches every day, and the passage of the cataract is utterly impossible.

A Critical Position.

WADY HALFA, Aug. 20. Letters have been received from Colonel Colville, who left here for Dongola, with a body of Bedonins, some days ago. It is stated that the Bedonins refuse to proceed. Colonel Colville's position is critical, he will return to Wady Halfa.

The Chinese Indemnity.

LONDON, Aug. 20. A despatch from Peking to the Times says: "France has reduced the indemnity demanded in China to 200,000,000 francs. The French Minister has been ordered to withdraw if the payment is refused.

Not Guilty.

DUBLIN, Aug. 20. The trial of Ex-Secretary Cornwall, was concluded before the Commission Court to-day, and a verdict of Not Guilty was rendered.
