At the 6th annual conference, held last week in Banff, the annual report of the 6,000 member organization showed membership expansion of 120 per cent, and a 30 per cent gain in student enrollees. \$20,000 was earmarked for a study on modern financial careers, and the new Board completed plans for a number of other activities.

Before County Magistrate

A resident of Lake Verde, convicted for the second time in 1957, of speeding, was fined \$50, a 30 day or 30 days by Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet at the Wednesday morning sitting of the Queen's County Magistrate's Court. A speeder from Bedford and another from the City were each fined \$10, and costs or 10 days, and a fourth speeder, from Lake Verde, was fined \$15, and costs or 10 days.
A resident of Covehead Road, was fined \$5, and costs or 5 days for failing to stop at a stop sign, and a City man facing the same charge, was reprimanded, as was another City resident who was charged with driving with defective equipment. A fine of \$10, and costs or ten days was imposed upon another City resident, who was convicted for driving on the left hand side of the highway centre line and overtaking and passing another vehicle when the highway was not clear.
Charged under the Excise Act with possession of a still for the illegal manufacture of intoxicating spirits, a resident of Pleasant Grove was further remanded to July 8th. A similar remand was given to a City resident who pleaded not guilty to a charge of possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than his residence. Two Scotchfold Women, each facing the latter charge, were dismissed.

Clashes Mark Election Day In Egypt

CAIRO (Reuters)—A number of voters were wounded by gunfire as clashes erupted in several towns during balloting in Egypt's general election, it was announced Wednesday night.
The interior ministry said 80 persons were arrested after a clash at Dina. Shots were fired during fights in Mansoura, Benha and Damanhur in Lower Egypt. Details of injuries and damage were not given immediately.
The election was the first since parliament was dissolved in 1952. All the 1,241 candidates for 270 seats in the national assembly were chosen by a ministerial committee headed by President Gamal Abdel Nasser.
The dull campaign consisted exclusively of support for Nasser and opposition to the Eisenhower Middle East doctrine. Voting for men was compulsory.
The interior ministry said the sealed ballot boxes will be opened this morning.
A spokesman said: "We are not able to estimate the percentage of votes cast but generally the polling was the heaviest yet."
Women, voting in a general election for the first time, were the most untiring campaign workers and enthusiastic voters in Cairo. They sidled along the lines at the booths pushing the claims of their candidates.
