A DESPATCH from Liverpool, G. B., Feb. 4th, states the brig, Arthur, of P. E. Island, from Charleston (Charlottetown, P. E. I.), at Runcorn, in leaving the latter port, Jan. 27th, struck the pier, and had her cutwater split; on the 20th her mainboom carried away during heavy weather, and on the 1st inst. was in collision near Runcorn with the Water Nymph, of Padstow, and the conquest, also of Padstow. Damage not yet ascertained.

THOSE FIVE CHILDREN.—A correspondent gives the following particulars about the five children at a birth in Picton county. Their lengths were respectively, 14, 15, 15 1/2, 16 3/4 inches—total 6 ft. 3 1/4 inches. Weight 2 lb 8 oz., 3 lb, 3 lb., 3 lb 4 oz., 3 lb 6 oz., and 3 lb 14 oz.—total 16 lbs. The first born, which is the smallest, is still living. The other four are dead. The correspondent adds that the "mother is doing well, and there are good hopes of pulling the old man through." His age is 65 years and the mother's 32.

A STRANGE ANIMAL.—The Barney River correspondent of the New Glasgow Chronicle says:—"Considerable excitement and alarm has been occasioned to the inhabitants of French River, during the last two weeks, by the appearance of a strange animal in the woods near the settlement of Glenshee. The animal is described, by persons who have seen it, as walking erect, its body like the form of a man, and having a head resembling that of a monkey. Its cry resembles that of a human being in distress. It is variously christened 'Yoho,' 'Indian Devil,' etc. Possibly it may have escaped from a menagerie. If the reported alarm really prevails, I would suggest the animal be hunted up and captured."

The court was then adjourned until Wednesday, the 3rd of March next, when it will meet to deliver judgment in cases argued last Michaelmas and previous terms and also to hear motions for new trials, &c.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

BERLIN, Feb. 21.

Lately the Czar hardly ever left the Winter Palace. When abroad he was surrounded by a cloud of mounted officers who concealed the carriage and protected the inmate with their bodies. At the Palace he was accessible only to Diplomats and military officers of the household. At the chapel the detectives occupied seats formerly reserved for distinguished visitors. Detectives investigated the kitchen. Every dish was tasted by persons of rank specially selected for the purpose. The Emperor did not even venture to open his letters, documents steeped in poison having repeatedly been sent him.

The Tagblatt relates that for some days past the Czar daily received sealed letters containing a few words of menace, and saying that if he did not change his system of oppression he would not live to celebrate the 25th anniversary of his accession.

DUBLIN, Feb. 22.

The distress in Ireland grows more widespread daily. It is only through the admirable machinery of distribution organized by the Mansion House and the Duchess of Marlborough Committees that actual starvation is checked. The famine will probably intensify during the coming fortnight, after which for a short period it will be less severe, in consequence of the employment of labor in sowing crops. This done, the worst crisis will follow. Jonathan Pim, famous for his labors in 1847, states that the worst time will be the last fortnight in May, all through June and the first two weeks in July.

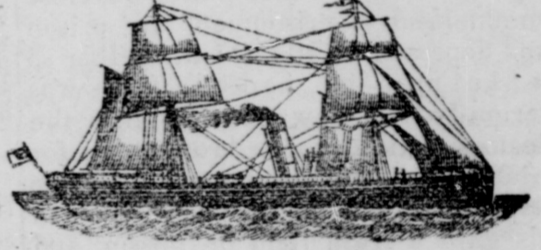
