Makes Strong Plea For War Veterans In Budget Speech

A strong plea for greater consideration of war veterans when giving Government jobs was made in the Legislature by Maj. John A. MacDonald, Third Kings, during his participation in the Budget debate in the Legislature this week.

Maj. MacDonald said the veterans were asking for nothing more than a chance when they had equal abilities. He thought there were many positions, especially as road supervisors, which the veterans could fill equally as well as others and he felt they were entitled to them.

The speaker also was critical of the lack of defence contracts coming to this Province and said he was not getting a fair share in the matter of primary products. He agreed with others that Prince Edward Island could be supplying many things used in defence work or by the Armed Forces.

The member from Cardigan expressed his pleasure at the work being done by the Tourist Bureau. He said it must be a good job when it was making a major contribution to the Province's industry of tourism amounting to \$4 million annually. He thought it should be developed to the fullest.

Snowplow Allocation

He doubted that the disposition of the snowplows was as good as it might have been last winter, but he realized the Department of Highways had been faced with a real emergency. He had heard it mentioned that this Province should get a snowblower and said that though he knew it was an expensive piece of machinery it might be a profitable purchase if we had a couple more winters like the past one. He thought there should be a plow stationed at Cardigan which could go down to the St. Georges district where the people were often tied up for days on end waiting for mail which could not get through. He also believed that there should be more than one bulldozer in Kings County.

He asked the Minister of Highways if there would be any consideration given to paving the short road to Cardigan Post Office from the St. Georges area. He realized that there was another road but by a quirk of nature people preferred to use the one and it would be a great convenience to them.

Maj. MacDonald hoped that the Government was not going back into the shipping business again by owning a boat. After the losses suffered through the Eskimo it would not be a good idea as it requires a thoroughly experienced man, he said, to handle a shipping business.

Death Yesterday Of Mrs. John Jeffery

The death occurred yesterday at her home in Lower Montague, after a lengthy illness, of Mrs. John Jeffery in her 85th year.

Mrs. Jeffery was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Landry, Lower Montague. Her husband predeceased her a number of years ago.

Left to mourn her passing are one son John, with whom she resided, and three daughters, Margaret, Mrs. John MacKenzie; Frances, Mrs. Seymour Acorn, both of Montague, and Maty, Mrs. John McKeearney, Lower Montague.

The funeral will be held Monday morning from her late residence to St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church, Montague.

Interment will be in the church cemetery.

Unemployment Showed Increase Early In March

OTTAWA, April 4 — (CP) — Unemployment increased during the first two weeks of March, the Labor Department reported today.

The rate of increase stepped up over the previous two weeks, reversing a downturn in the rate. By March 13, Canada had 377,000 unemployed — 82,000 more than a year earlier but under the 1950 post-war winter peak of about 400,000.

For the fortnight reviewed by the Department, the increase in those seeking jobs through National Employment Service was 6,800. In the previous two weeks, it has been only 2,200.

A major reason given for the higher unemployment was that many workers were being released from logging camps in Eastern Canada as the cutting season ended. There was a drop of 8,000 in logging jobs in Eastern Canada during the first week of March.

Meanwhile, the Department said, there was no marked pickup in labor demand in any area except British Columbia. There, hitting by logging, mining and construction firms was rising rapidly.

Despite the larger numbers of those seeking work, the Department said, employment in heavy industry and in defence-connected industries continues to be maintained, with an increased demand for skilled workers developing.

British Columbia and Ontario were the only two regions to show an improvement in the employment situation.

The Atlantic region — the Maritimes and Newfoundland — had 50,200 unemployed at March 13, which was 3,400 more than two weeks earlier.

Atlantic: St. John's, Nfld. 8,793 (8,390); Charlottetown 1,780 (1,759); Halifax 3,773 (3,649); Sydney 3,907 (3,883); Moncton 4,834 (4,575); Saint John 1,501 (1,576).

Georgetown Captures Three Provincial Hockey Titles

Eagles Intermediate "B" Champions

Scouts Triumph In Island Series

School Girls Are Again Champions

For the first time in Hockey History, in a Town noted for years as a producer of good hockey players, a team, the Georgetown Eagles have won the Intermediate "B" Championship of Prince Edward Island. Once in a decade a team will blazon its name across the Hockey Skies, and for some indeed the reason they catch and hold the fancy of the fans at home and on the road. Such a team was the Georgetown Eagles of 1952, as they came, like a brilliant star out of the east, and pained luster as they roared along the playoff trails to their goal, (the Intermediate "B" Crown) and culminated the achievement by extending the star-studded Charlottetown Abbies to the limit to hold this "Eagle" team for the Intermediate "A" Title.

Playing only their third season with the benefit of a regulation size ice-surface at home, lacking the big-time coaching such as enjoyed by some of their opponents, they nevertheless covered their heads-up, head-hitting never-say-die goal to land in the driver's seat. It is not the writer's intention to mention any player or players, as a unit they fought and won and as a unit we will keep them.

In 14 League and Exhibition Games they scored 109 goals for a near eight goal a game average to 80 goals against them or a 5.71 goal a game against average. In some of these tilts they were minus their regular net custodian and on several occasions some of their star performers.

In Intermediate "B" playoffs in seven games they scored 45 goals for a 6.43 goal a game average as against 26 scored against them or a 4.71 goal a game against average. In all intermediate "B" games for the season they amassed 154 goals to 105 scored by their opponents.

In the Intermediate "A" series they lost to the Charlottetown Abbies, 12 to 8 on the round. In the first game of this series, played in Georgetown, the teams split a pair of markers in each of the second and third periods and who knows in the first period, when the Abbies gained their two goal margin, what would have been the outcome had not one of the Eagles great forwards been forced out of action in the first minute of play and could not return to the ice for the balance of the first period.

In the second game played in the larger Charlottetown Forum they skated with such speed, slick-handled with such proficiency and checked so tenaciously that they held a tie score at the 15:00 minute mark of the final period.

In Montague, Souris, Cornwall and Borden they met and defeated the best the Province had to offer in Intermediate "B" hockey and performed the hat-trick as they won for their Town its third 1952 Provincial Title. To each and every member of this great team, to Manager and Coach Raymond Laverdier and to Trainer Clarence McSwain the citizens of Georgetown say "WELL DONE" and extend their sincerest congratulations for a tremendous and never-to-be-forgotten season of hockey.

A gloom of sadness was cast over the district of East Point, P. E. I. and surrounding neighborhood when it became known that Mrs. John Gillis had passed away on February 8th, 1952. She was in her sixty second year.
