The annual Sunday School convention for the North West Queens district met at the Cavendish United Church on Monday, June 26th. The theme was "Ambassadors For Christ". The convention was opened with the worship service in charge of North Rustico United Sunday School, led by Mrs. Ernest MacLure. The organist was Mrs. Orville Sellar. Hymns sung were "One Who is all Unfit to Count as Scholars in thy School," and "Where Cross the Crowded Ways of Life."

Scripture reading II Corinthians Chap. 5 was read by Mrs. Ernest MacLure. Rev. George Gough spoke on "Ambassadors for Christ". All nations have ambassadors, their job is to keep the nations on friendly terms. Paul was an ambassador for Christ, his ambition was to exalt Christ. Prayer followed by Rev. George Gough. The President thanked North Rustico S.S. for the service. Miss Martha Brown was appointed press secretary. Introduction of delegates by Rev. James B. Wilson, representative of M.R.E.C. The business session was opened by calling on the secretary-treasurer, Ella Semple, to read the minutes of last convention and the 1949 financial statement, allocation of \$50.00 was reached. These were passed on motion duly seconded and agreed to.

Retiring President's Address

Address by retiring president, Mr. Fulton Robertson: "We are living in perilous times, press on, the world future depends on the Sunday Schools. God will bless you in your work." Rev. James B. Wilson, representative of M.R.E.C. spoke of the World Convention on Christian Education which is to be held in Toronto August 10th to 16th, 1950. The secretary was asked to write to M.R.E.C. for the demonstration. Benediction by Rev. George Gough closed the afternoon session. Supper was served after which delegates discussed Sunday School problems.

Evening session opened with a sing song, organist, Mr. Ray Higgins, Hunter River. Divine worship in charge of Cavendish Sunday School, led by Mrs. George Gough, organist Mrs. MacCoubrey. 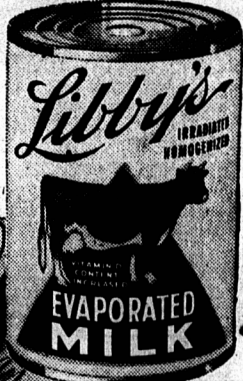
