In addition to these Mr. Cummiekey is Speaker and Mr. F. Peters is in British Columbia; so that neither of them can be counted upon in support of the government. The government is evidently afraid to fill the seat of the latter,—well knowing that Fort Augustus will elect a supporter of the opposition at the first opportunity. Then there are Mr. Medie Gallant and the Hon. William Campbell, both of whom have to run the gauntlet of the courts. We confidently anticipate that the former will be unseated and the letter retained.

If this expectation should be borne out, and opponents of the government be elected for the Tignish and Fort Augustus districts, the parties, the government's majority will for practical purposes be reduced to all but 0.

MORE TERRITORY.

A large addition has lately been made to the British Empire. The British South African Company have, heretofore, had only mining and trading rights in Barotseland. But the King of that country has decided to come in under the British flag and has ceded to Great Britain the whole basin of the Upper Zambesi, which includes the awe-inspiring Victoria Falls, next to Niagara the most wonderful in the world. The British frontier in South Africa now extends to the borders of the Congo Free State, and German and Portuguese South Africa. So peacefully and quietly the realm of Victoria the Good is extending together with the blessings of civilization and Christianity. Surely, "peace hath her victories, no less renowned than war."

QUESTION TO BE ANSWERED.

The Patriot expatiates on the prosperity of Canada under the Liberals. It will be remembered that, according to their ante-election predictions, we were all to grow rich under Liberal rule, as a result of Free Trade and Economical Government. But we still have the N. P., with its incidental protection and high taxation; and the Government's expenditures have increased by well-nigh ten millions of dollars a year. So if we are prospering, as the Patriots say we are, the fact is not due to Free Trade or Liberal economy. CANADIAN BANKS.

Object to Paying the United States War Tax.

BUFFALO, Nov. 18.—Special International Revenue Commissioner Brown has received a communication from Washington requesting him to put before the people in a conspicuous manner section 11 of the War Revenue Act. The latter states that complaints have been made to the Treasury Department by the United States District Attorney E. P. Close, regarding the payment of the revenue stamp tax on drafts and cheques sent from this side to Canada. The complaint implies that when a party wishes to send a draft or order from Canada he goes to the Canadian banks and makes out the instrument. The bank transacts the business through their New York correspondents. When the person to whom the draft or order is made out receives it, he endorses it in favor of some creditor, without putting on the necessary stamp. When the draft or order is forwarded to New York for collection, the stamp is put on by the New York bank, and the bill is turned to the Canadian bank from which the document was sent. The banks of Canada object to paying this, as they have in no way benefited by the transaction. Section 11 provides that the acceptors of any draft or order from a foreign country must stamp it. If anyone neglects to do this, he is subject to a fine of \$100. The Canadian banks, through their local attorneys, propose to prosecute persons who fail to comply with this law.

SANK IN THREE MINUTES.

Seventy People Drowned in a Steamship Collision.

VANCOUVER, B.C., Nov. 17.—The Royal mail steamer Empress of China arrived this morning from Yokohama and Hong Kong. She brings news of a terrible disaster on October 25, when the steamer Kiashiv-Maru came into collision with the O.S.K. steamer Myagawa-Maru, off Takami, 85 miles from the coast, with the result that the latter sank in a few minutes.

Boats were lowered from both vessels and 120 persons were saved, but quite 70 were drowned.

The Myagawa sank in three minutes. So strong was the impact that the captain, who was on the bridge, was thrown into the sea. All the crew were saved, and the captain also.

Why did They Leave Her?

WASHINGTON, November 18.—A court of enquiry into the abandonment of the Maria Teresa will be held. The details of the court of enquiry has been announced as follows: Captain Day, Commander Souler and Commander Tiley, with Captain Waller, marine corps, as judge advocate.

Britain's Beer.

LONDON, Nov. 18.—Sir Michael Hicks-Beach recently stated that during the financial year just concluded 35,000,000 barrels of beer had been produced in the United Kingdom, and that the taxation borne by that beer amounted to \$60,000,000, \$5,000 more than in the previous year.
