The Anti-Rent Agitation.

LONDON, Dec. 10. The Glasgow Mail says it is authorized to state that Gladstone does not approve of the anti-rent campaign inaugurated by the National League in Ireland.

Vessels Ashore.

LONDON, Dec. 10. The bark Fremad, from Parrsboro, N.S., is ashore at Bridgewater; bark Roycroft, at Londonderry; from St. John, N.B., went ashore yesterday; bark Wild Rose, from Quebec, Oct. 20, for Port Madoc, is ashore at Crickath, partly dismantled. The crew have landed.

Lifeboat Casualties.

LONDON, Dec. 10. A lifeboat has been wrecked at Southport while endeavoring to relieve a distressed vessel, and thirteen persons were drowned.

Another Fire.

HALIFAX, Nov. 10. At La Have Ferry to-day Garrett Miller's store and dwelling were burned. Miller lost everything. His valuable papers and deeds were burned, and he was hurt severely about the head. No insurance.

A New Cathedral.

HALIFAX, Dec. 10. A committee of the Diocesan synod met to-day and decided to erect a new cathedral at a cost of \$250,000, to commemorate the centennial of colonial episcopacy and Queen Victoria's jubilee.

Killed His Mother.

QUEBEC, Dec. 10. A young man named Benoit got under the influence of liquor and threw a decanter at his mother. It struck her on the head, inflicting, it is believed, fatal injuries.

Hackmen on Sunday Driving.

TORONTO, Dec. 10. The Hack and Coupe drivers have sent a circular to the various city clergymen asking assistance to obtain legislation for doing away with Sunday driving.

Another Prohibition.

LONDON, Dec. 10. The Queen has forbidden the admission into the household of Windsor Castle of any newspapers containing reports of the Campbell divorce case.

Terrible Weather.

HALIFAX, Dec. 10. The steamer Hartpool, from Cooswa for London, put in short of coal, having experienced terrible weather.

Abandoned at Sea.

NEW YORK, Dec. 10. Bark Cremona, from Accra, Africa, for Boston, with a cargo of palm oil and gun cotton, was abandoned at sea and set fire to; crew rescued.

A Fire Raging.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Dec. 10. A disastrous fire is reported as raging at Attica, Ohio, which has already involved a loss of \$1,500,000.

The Halifax Exports.

HALIFAX, Dec. 10. Halifax exports for November, show \$200,000 increase over November last year.
