Board Considers Trades Request

The Provincial Labor Relations Board will meet today to consider a request for exemption from the present minimum wage law, Charles McQuaid, board secretary, said yesterday.

Mr. McQuaid said the first session was purely a fact finding one, as the Board investigated a request from one of the unorganized trades to have established a specific wage rate applicable to them, rather than the general 90 cents per hour minimum.

It is believed other trades such as carpentry, brick laying and others, have minimum wages rates higher than the general rate, and the present request is for similar treatment.

The specific trade involved was not identified by Mr. McQuaid but he noted that subsequent meetings will be held with the employers to ascertain their views before any decision is reached.

Mutchale Mobile Feed Service, of Charlottetown says the big advantage of the service is that it brings the feed mill to the farmer instead of the farmer having to take his grain to the mill.

The mobile unit, first in this area, consists of a complete feed mill that grinds all farm grown grains and roughages according to the farmer's specifications, mixes the ground material with feed concentrates and blends in fresh liquid molasses to produce any desired formula.

The mill, carried on a truck, is powered by its own diesel engine and is driven from farm to farm on a regular route schedule.

The owner says that as a result of eliminating feed handling and travel, the new service should prove to be highly economical to the customers.
