Terrible Death at Moncton.

SACKVILLE, Nov. 2. A man named William Dawson, section-man at Moncton, was killed there this morning. He has been employed on the road ever since commencement of Northern Division. While shunting, the cars ran over him, completely cutting him in two at the hips.

Gladstone on Church Disestablishment

LONDON, Oct. 31. Gladstone has written a highly important letter on Church Disestablishment. He taunts the Tories with thrusting the question forward as a political dodge. He affirms that the project belongs to a dim distant future, and that the public mind is not prepared for the scheme. In conclusion he says:—"The subject is for others and not for me to deal with."

Irishmen Meet in Glasgow.

GLASGOW, Oct. 31. A great meeting of Irishmen was held here to-night. Timothy O'Connor presided. John Redmond, M. P., made a speech, in course of which he said he believed that boycotting was a safe guard against crime. All the speakers strongly advocated implicit obedience to Parnell as a matter of policy.

The Egyptian Difficulty—A Bloody Fight.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 1. A bloody fight is reported at Baku, on the Caspian Sea, between the Moslems and Russians. The military had to be called out to restore order. In the fighting, several Russians were killed and a large number wounded.

The French in Tonquin.

PARIS, Oct. 31. Voltaire states that the French forces in Tonquin, owing to the recent victory over the Black Flag, is to be reduced to 12,000 men with 3,200 Annam recruits, which it is believed will suffice to secure quiet in the Delta of Red River as far as Yuana.

Steamboat Explosion.

DETROIT, Nov. 1. This morning the tug Moffatt put into Sombra. As she was making fast to the wharf her boiler exploded, carrying away the upper works and a large part of the deck planking. Four men were killed and two injured.

The Tories and the Corn Duties.

LONDON, Oct. 31. Lord Salisbury, replying to a letter from the electors, says the Conservatives are strongly opposed to reimposing the duty on corn.

Death of a Nobleman.

DUBLIN, Oct. 31. James Hamilton, Duke of Abercorn, died this evening. He was father of the Marchioness of Lansdowne.
