NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CANADIAN.

TORONTO, Aug. 13. The Globe this morning contains the following special cable.

LONDON, Aug. 13. Sir John Macdonald's Pacific Railway negotiations are within a few hours of completion. A city firm of the highest standing and solvency is willing to take the offer over from the Dominion Government. Hon. Mr. Mowatt has returned London from the Continent.

OTTAWA, Aug. 13. Sir John Macdonald, Sir Chat Tupper, and Hon. Mr. Pope have bespoken passages on the outgoing Inman steamer, sailing from Liverpool on the 2nd of Sept. Probably several of the negotiating capitalists will take passage for Canada at the same time.

The rumor that Parliament is to be called for despatch of business in October, can be traced to no reliable source.

Repairs to the geological museum are being vigorously prosecuted. A charge of perjury has been preferred against several parties interested in the McGibney land dispute by W. James. The case will be commenced on Saturday.

The Canada Railway Commission will resume its sittings at 1 o'clock to-day. The examinations of Mr. Trueman, Deputy Minister of Railways and Canals will be continued.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Aug. 13. At one o'clock on Thursday morning, nearly a hundred armed Irishmen, in six boats, boarded the Norwegian ship Juno, repairing at the Passage of Ireland. They fastened the crew in the fore-cabin and the captain and revenue officers in the cabin, then removed the contents of the cabin, placing an armed sentinel over them. They then removed the cases of smooth-bore muskets, 47 guns from her hold, and escaped. The robbers cut the telegraph wires to Cork, and the news was sent to the police by horse express. The captain of the Juno says he saw an injured man taken out of a boat and landed. He appeared to be dead. A portion of his scalp was found there. The captain had received a letter bearing the Cork post mark, apologizing for the trouble given him, and stating that the robbers were not what were expected. The robbers thought they were breech-loaders, and if such had been the case they would have given him a draft on their friends in New York for their value.

CORK, Aug. 13. The ropes supporting the platform at the land meeting at Clonmel yesterday were discovered cut through after the platform had fallen.

BELGRADE, Aug. 13. The Porte has informed Servia that her explanation of mobilization of Servian militia is unsatisfactory.

LONDON, Aug. 13. The attempt of the young physician Lyons to fast fifteen days was abandoned after a week's abstinence.

PARIS, Aug. 13. A mass of earth fell yesterday and crushed two houses at Vieuxport, near Poitiers. Ten bodies are recovered and ten more are under the ruins.

LONDON, Aug. 13. According to the arrangements now made by the Government, it is not expected that Parliament will rise before the 11th September.

The report that the Albanians had blown up the Greek Consulate at Pristrend is confirmed. Twelve men were killed and twenty-five wounded.

The Manchester "Guardian" says there is little change in business, but it is not growing worse. There is rather more enquiry in some directions, and the tone of the market is somewhat more hopeful.

UNITED STATES.

ST. PAUL, Aug. 13. A freight train on the St. Paul and Deinth Railway was wrecked near Pine City this morning. Three boys living at Allineapolis, who were stowed away in a freight car to steal a ride, were killed.

CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 13. Yesterday John McDonald appeared in Niles, a small town near here, looking for work. To-day at noon, on going home, Darius Parks found McDonald in his house with Mrs. Parks. McDonald was ordered out of the house, but instead of going he undertook to put Parks out, whereupon the latter seized a gun and lodged fourteen shots in McDonald's heart. Parks gave himself up to the authorities, and is held on a charge of murder.

NEW YORK, Aug. 13. Serious trouble is feared at Rockaway, the 420 Canadian workmen not having been paid to-day. They threaten the hotel and its contractors.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 13. Gon Canto was voted at Mazatlan, and it is stated that Sinola is in the hands of Ramirez, an ally of Gergues, Zacotecas, Leon Jalix, Sinola and Sinora have risen. It is believed that a general taking up of arms is directed against the new President, Gonzales.
