INCREASE IN INSURANCE RATES.—An important meeting of insurance agents was held here Wednesday. The proposed increase in the tariff of rates throughout P. E. Island was discussed. It is understood, as a result of the conference, that the rates on all kinds of risks throughout P. E. Island will be increased. A second meeting was also held, at which representatives of all British, Canadian and American offices were present to consider the proposed increase in rates as advocated by the home offices. No decisive action will be taken until the receipt of the answer to the representations made to the home offices after the meeting on Saturday last.—Halifax Herald.

BIG GOLD DISCOVERY.—Great excitement prevails in Truro just now in consequence of a big discovery of gold at Carribou mines, worked by the Truro Gold Mining Company, about thirty miles from that town. The present discovery surpasses anything yet discovered in Nova Scotia, and is expected to turn out the biggest and richest gold mine ever opened in Canada. The first crushing was twenty eight tons and yielded over 105 ounces of gold. At a greater depth the next lot showed a more encouraging increase, that yielding 272 ounces from 22 tons of quartz which shows a value of \$5,091, the total expense of mining and milling not exceeding \$700. One worth over \$1000 per ton is coming out and more is being uncovered. This is not a nugget mine as the strike gradually increases in richness and thickness and shows every indication of continuing to great depths. Many other leads are known by their croppings to intersect the mining areas, but their richness is yet undetermined, being totally undeveloped.
