Cy, who celebrated his 84th birthday today, thinks the game has been changed and that present rules tie down pitchers too much. He especially dislikes the one-second stop between the windup and the throw.

"When a pitcher starts his action he should go through with it. That pause makes it harder on a pitcher's arm," he added.

He also thinks the game is different today.

"The fans want to see the ball hit over the fence now," he explained. "And that's what they want a lot of long-ball hitting."

"Before they wanted to see base running and inside-the-park baseball," he added.

SYDNEY, March 29 — Leo Lamoureux and his P. E. Islanders hockey team landed in this Cape Breton centre hale and hearty about 3:30 this afternoon, ready for their pending opening battle here tomorrow night against the Sydney Millionaires in their best-of-seven series for the all-Maritime major hockey title. With husky defenceman Johnny Dutchak at the controls of the big Maritime Central Airways DC-3, they made a perfect three-point landing at the Sydney airport after an uneventful trip from the P. E. I. capital.

Did we say Dutchak at the controls? Well that is exactly who it was. Johnny, who spent three years in the Air Force as a pilot during the war, is taking advantage of getting in a few extra hours of flying during some of the Islanders' air trips, and is expected to go on M. C. A.'s payroll this summer during his off season from hockey wars.

Others making the flight with the team were Major Tom Rogers, Islanders Club president, Mrs. W. J. Brown, wife of Forum manager Bill Brown of Charlottetown and Mr. Stems Webster, of the Charlottetown City Police Force. Stems, incidentally, is not on duty but just taking a brief holiday to take in the two big games here on Friday and Saturday.

Getting back to the team itself, the boys are in razor-sharp form for the big opener when they will carry the colors of the Island into battle in quest of a Maritime title for the first time in so many years that it is better if it not be put down in round figures. Those on the trip are goalies Hal Gordon and Dennis Brodeur, defencemen Johnny Dutchak, Phil Vitale, George McLagan, Larry Travis and Jack Ready, with forwards Wes "Bucko" Trainor, Bruno Favero, Walter Pawlyshyn, Hub Beaudry, Johnny Horeck, Marcel Clements, Frank Balthage, Danny Horeck, Mac Beaton and Jack Morrow.

The boys here would need to be feeling in fine shape too because the general hockey public in this centre are not giving Islanders very much hope to eliminate the Cape Breton champions. Some quarters here are quoting the Sydney club to take the series in four straight, while the more liberal ones are calling Millionaires the winner in six games. Those who think the Islanders will win the series are hard to find. The Islanders have other ideas, however, and they really mean business.

Being the current talk of hockey fans everywhere in the Maritimes, there is no doubt about it that it will be a great series, probably the closest that has taken place between the two league champions for a good number of years. They have both made strong showings in their respective circuits that they have pretty well dominated all through the schedule and playoff competitions. They both are well laden with speed, scoring power and favor the wide-open, aggressive style of play.

From what has been seen of the two teams in action against one another in a series of five exhibition tilts during the season, the Sydney club perhaps holds the edge on polished passing and fast breaking attack, while on the other hand the Islanders appear to hold the advantage in hitting power and organized pressure plays that are hard to cope with and have a habit of paying off in goals. There is little difference between the two clubs to the casual observer, but what held true in exhibition tilts may be far from the mark when they meet in series play for high stakes.

In those five contests they broke even on games won and lost, both winning and losing two games and battling to a deadlock in the other. Sydney held the edge on goals scored, with Islanders falling down in that respect during one contest that accounted for most of the difference. That in itself may have meant something, but then again it may have no bearing on the result of the forthcoming series. Islanders had had a particularly heavy schedule prior to that game, which was their last meeting played at New Glasgow, and they were considerably leg-weary at the time.

Leafs And Bruins Both Suffering From Injuries

TORONTO, March 29—(CP)—Boston Bruins and Toronto Maple Leafs added up their injuries today and neither found much satisfaction in the result.

The Leafs discovered that Al Rollins, their brilliant rookie goalie, won't be able to play again this season. He suffered a strained knee ligament last night when the Bruins beat the Leafs 2-0 to take a 1-0 lead in their best-of-seven Stanley Cup semi-final.

Coach Lynn Patrick of the Bruins reported that there's some question as to when left wing Vic Lynn will get into action again. The former Leaf has a charley horse. It was an old injury aggravated in last night's hard-checking battle.

Patrick also reported: Steve Kraftcheck, rookie defenceman, hurt his knee; defenceman Max Quackenbush, who went into the game with one sore wrist, came out with two; veteran centre Milt Schmidt's injured knee hasn't improved.

Glad To Have Turk
For the Leafs, the loss of Rollins was softened by the knowledge that old Turk Broda will go back between the goal posts again. At 36, the National Hockey League's oldest active player, the Turk bears the reputation of being one of the most effective "money" goalies hockey has known.

Broda went into goal last night after the first-period injury to the 24-year-old Rollins, the Vanguard, Sask., player who won the Vezina goaltending award in the N.H.L.'s scheduled season. The Turk played brilliantly although he yielded one of the two

goals. Twice he outguessed Boston forwards on breakaway plays—first Dunc Fisher, then Lynn Rollins was hurt in a collision with Pete Horeck when he dashed out of his net to beat the Boston player to a loose puck.

Big Harry Watson, a handy man in tough playoff going, is still a Toronto question mark for the second game of the series Saturday night. A minor shoulder separation last Saturday night put the left winger temporarily on the shelf.

One Bright Spot
Patrick found one bright spot in his injury picture. Defenceman Murray Henderson who missed the opener skated in a light drill the Bruins held today and felt pretty good. He may be ready by Saturday.

There was elation in the Boston camp over their opening victory over the series favorites. But they don't think it's all settled yet.

"We're very happy to get one game up," said Patrick. "But anything can happen before the series is over—and probably will."

A club doctor diagnosed Rollins' injury as of the same type as the one which laid Ted Kennedy up for 15 games last season. It is expected that an estimate of the length of the convalescence the goalie will need will be given in 10 days.

Said Rollins, from his hospital bed: "I saw the picture in the paper, the one where it shows him (Horeck) coming at me. It was pretty-obvious what his intentions were. There certainly wasn't any need for it."

Washington Senators To Make Better Showing

ORLANDO, Fla., March 29 — (AP) — A year ago Bucky Harris ascended the experts by guiding the Washington "misfits," an all-time unanimous pre-season collar choice, into fifth place in the American League. It was an accomplishment comparable to his winning the pennant with New York Yankees in 1947.

"I won't predict where we'll finish," Harris says. "But we're going to win more games than we did last year. Let the standings take care of themselves."

The 1950 Nats won 67 games, seven in front of the sixth-place Chicago White Sox but wound up 25 games out of the first division.

"This is an entirely different team than the one that began the 1950 campaign," Bucky said. "We're starting out with Mickey Vernon at first, Cass Michaels at second and Bob Kuzava, Gene Bearden and Sanadito Consuegra on the mound. Not one of them was with us last opening day."

These five, together with outfielders Irv Noren, Sam Mele, Gil Coan, third-baseman Eddie Yost and pitcher Sid Hudson, comprise the Senators' strength.

"It's not an outstanding team," Harris said frankly, "but it is a good defensive club that has some balance. If we get the pitching, we'll be hard to beat."

Harris intends to open with 11 pitchers, three catchers, five outfielders and six infielders. Hudson, his big winner last year; Bearden, Kuzava and Consuegra are his big four. Veteran Joe Haynes and Cuban Conrado Marrero will battle it out for the fifth starting assignment. Mickey Harris again will

Lively Discussion On Racing Dates

A statement that "Charlottetown wants to take all the racing days from the rest of the Province" brought forth considerable discussion in the Legislature yesterday morning during the second reading of a bill designed to prevent the doping of race horses.

The statement was made by Mr. Carrol Delaney, Summerside, who introduced the amendment which asked that a Commission be appointed to allot racing dates so that other tracks would be sure of getting racing cards and that legislation be enacted so that the public could have full confidence in the pari-mutuals. The amendment was ruled out of order by the chairman and was added to the bill.

Mr. R. R. Bell said he was surprised by the statement of the member from Summerside. Any track could hold a race any day it wanted to, he said. He explained that night races would be held at the Charlottetown track on Wednesday and Saturday nights this year but that three Wednesday's would be left open for races at St. Peter's, Covehead and Souris. Parkview had intimated that it would not hold races this year, he added.

He was asked by Hon. A. W. Matheson, about the effect two races in Charlottetown each week would have on other tracks.

Mr. Bell replied that there were 160 horses stabled at the Exhibition Barn last year and that two night races a week were needed in order to give all horses an opportunity to race. In addition to leaving three Wednesday's open for the country tracks they had also left July 1 open for the Summerside races, he stated.

Hon. Eugene Cullen asked if he, Mr. Bell, thought it would be good for the horse breeders of the Province to hold night races at Charlottetown twice a week?

Mr. Bell replied that the Charlottetown track was always very co-operative with the country tracks and brought the mainland horses here that were used on other tracks as well as their own.

Mr. John MacLean, Souris, urged that something be done to protect the small tracks. Mr. Speaker Phillips said that the United States Trotting Association, under which Island tracks are registered, would look after the dates.

The bill itself may provide regulations governing inspection at race tracks and prohibiting the administering of harmful drugs to race horses. Any horses found guilty will be barred. A person found guilty of a fine of \$100 or in default of payment a period in prison not exceeding 30 days. The Act will be enforced when the Government proclaims regulations. The day of enforcement was not announced.

Rocket Richard Scores In 3rd Overtime For 1-0 Victory Over Detroit

DETROIT, March 29—(CP)— Maurice Richard rammed in a goal after 42:20 minutes of sudden-death overtime play tonight to give Montreal Canadiens a 1-0 victory over Detroit Red Wings in the second game of their semi-final Stanley Cup playoff series in the National Hockey League. Montreal now holds a 2-0 edge in the best-of-seven series.

It was the second straight night that Maurice Richard, Montreal's Rocket, had swept in and slapped home the winning goal in overtime play.

A crowd of 13,818 at Olympia Stadium watched Richard put on a burst of speed just after the start of the third 20-minute overtime period, take a pass from Billy Reay and push home the puck.

The game ended after 102:20 minutes of play. It came only two nights after Montreal had won a 121:09 minute game 3-2 and is believed to have bettered any existing records for the longest two consecutive overtime games.

The big story was Montreal goal-tender Gerry McNeil. He turned back all 42 shots the Detroiters threw at the goal and stretched his shutout mastery over the league champion Red Wings to 181.79 minutes.

The teams now move to Montreal.
