TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Suspensions in the Commons.

LONDON, Sept. 13. During the discussion in the Commons last night on the amendments made in the House of Lords to the coal mines bill, Graham, advanced Liberal member for Lanardshire, was suspended for refusing to apologize for derogatory reference to the House of Lords.

Edward Harrington, Nationalist member for West Kerry, was also suspended during last night's sitting. Harrington, after being warned for his utterances during the debate, was ordered by the Speaker to resume his seat. He replied passionately: "I will not resume my seat. You have been watching to pounce upon me ever since I rose. I claim my right to speak." Harrington was thereupon suspended, and retired from the House amid cheers by the Parnellite members.

A Temperance Convention.

TORONTO, Sept. 13. The special convention of temperance workers from different parts of the Dominion opened here to-day. It was decided to take united action in every repeal contest and use every effort to prevent the loss of one inch of ground, and that immediate steps be taken towards preventing the re-election of any member of Parliament who voted against the passing of the bill for the total prohibition of the liquor traffic.

Cheering and Stonings.

At a meeting of the National party yesterday 800 persons were present. A procession of 2,000 persons marched to the palace and cheered Ferdinand. It then proceeded to the residence of M. Kniavloff and stoned the windows. The police were unable to quell the disturbance, and many of them were injured.

An Alarming Statement.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 13. The United States Consul at Pictou, N. S., has transmitted to the State Department the information that a dangerous and contagious disease exists among horses and sheep in Nova Scotia, that it threatens the whole of Canada and may spread to the United States.

Died from His Injuries.

TRURO, Sept. 14. James Caston went on board the Quebec train last night to see some friends off, and while stepping from the train missed his step, and his right leg going under, it was cut off at the ankle. The leg was also fractured at the thigh. He died this morning.

Another Blaze.

SPRINGHILL MINES, N. S., Sept. 13. The Intercolonial Railway coal shed, with about 100 tons of coal, were destroyed by fire yesterday afternoon at Springhill Junction. Four gondola cars were also burned. The loss will be about \$6,000.

To be Investigated.

OTTAWA, Sept. 13. Minister Carling has instructed Chief Veterinary Inspector McEachern to proceed at once to Pictou and investigate matters in reference to the alleged cattle disease there.

O'Brien's Cell.

DUBLIN, Sept. 12. The Freeman's Journal says the cell in which O'Brien is confined at Cork is nine feet long, four broad and badly lighted. O'Brien is in excellent spirits.

Moonlighters Again.

DUBLIN, Sept. 13. Moonlighters last night murdered constable Weleham and mortally wounded another officer, near Ennis. Eight arrests have been made of suspected parties.

Another Demonstration.

DUBLIN, Sept. 13. A great demonstration is being organized at Mitchellstown for to-morrow, during the funeral of Shinnick, who was shot by the police last Friday.

Ferry Boats Collide.

TORONTO, Sept. 13. Three ferry boats collided in the bay to-night, and four men were thrown into the water. Three were saved and one drowned.

The Price of Sugar.

MONTREAL, Sept. 13. The wholesale grocers guild have raised the price of granulated sugar half a cent, making it 7 1/2 cents per pound.

The Truro Races.

TRURO, Sept. 14. About one thousand persons witnessed the races at the Driving Park this afternoon.
