SUMMERSIDE — Funeral services for John W. Waugh, who died Wednesday, were held from his late residence in New Annan Friday afternoon, Sept. 17.

He was left a semi-invalid and for the last five years was totally confined at home. The death occurred at his home where he was cared for by his son, Charles, and daughter-in-law, Henrietta.

Orangemen Ask End To Commission

CALGARY (CP)—A resolution asking for abolition of the royal commission on bilingualism and biculturalism has been sent to Prime Minister Pearson and other federal party leaders by the Grand Orange Lodge of Canada.

The Grand Master of the lodge, Carl Smith of Kingston, Ontario, said here in a resolution, which asks that the order-in-council which established the commission be revoked, was sent to the prime minister Sept. 9.

"We are either Canadians or we are not," he said. "We are opposed to biculturalism and bilingualism and feel the commission is doing no good. We want it thrown out."

A similar resolution was sent to government officials last year, he said, but nothing was done about it.

August Fish Landings Increase In Maritimes

Total fish landings in the Maritimes during August, 1965, amounted to 166,700,000 pounds valued at \$8,000,000. These totals included 61,800,000 pounds of groundfish valued at \$2,700,000, 98,400,000 pounds of pelagic and estuarial species valued at \$2,500,000 and 6,500,000 pounds of shellfish valued at \$3,100,000.

In comparison with the average August catch during the years 1962 to 1964, the month's total catch was above average by 69,400,000 pounds and \$2,500,000. Groundfish landings for August were above the average August catch during the years 1962 to 1964 by 14,100,000 pounds and \$795,000. The month's pelagic catch was above the three year August average by 54,600,000 pounds and \$951,000. Shellfish landings for August were 759,000 pounds and \$896,000 above the August 1962 to 1964 average. The increased groundfish catch during July was due to larger than normal landings of redfish and flatfishes. The larger than normal pelagic landings for August were the result of increased herring and mackerel landings during the month. The scallop catch mainly accounted for the increased shellfish landings for August, compared with the previous three years.

Cumulative fish landings in the Maritimes for the first eight months of 1965 amounted to 627,000,000 pounds, valued at \$44,800,000. The figures for the similar period of 1964 were 541,600,000 pounds valued at \$39,200,000 and for 1963 were 453,100,000 pounds valued at \$32,400,000.

All Qualified Must Be Assured Higher Education

ESPAÑOLA, Ont. (CP)—Financial difficulties must not prevent anyone from obtaining more education and governments are going to have to make it possible for all qualified students to get higher education, Prime Minister Pearson said here.

The prime minister in a speech at Espanola high school commencement exercises, told students their greatest opportunity now is to make the most of education and get more as university if possible.

"Governments are going to have to make this possible—this higher education—for every boy and girl who qualifies for it by the test of ability."

"Financial difficulties must not keep anyone away from getting more education. That would be a shameful waste of human resources."
