Reds Win Hard Fought Game From Giants 1-0; Tribe Halts Senators

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, May 4.—Carl Hubbell pitched four-hit ball at Cincinnati today but the New York Giants dropped their fourth game in five weeks as the Cincinnati Reds put over the only run of the game in the ninth for a 1-0 victory.

The only extra base blow off the Giants' southpaw ace was Liki Cuyler's triple to open the ninth, and it speeded Hubbell's downfall. He disposed of the next batter and purposely passed base Herman and Arnie Lombardi to load the bases.

With the Giants' outfield pulled in, Sammy Byrnes sent a fly to it and Liki Cuyler slid into the plate under Gus Mancuso with the deciding run.

The winning streak of St. Louis Cardinals was snapped at six as Boston Bees, with a four-run seventh inning, evened the series with a 7-6 victory at St. Louis.

Leroy Parmelee, hero of the Cards' 17-inning win over the Giants last week, was a victim of that rally which started after two were out. Joe Coscarati's double against the right field wall drove in three of the runs.

(By Eddie Brietz, Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, May 4.—The mysterious Mr. Harry Ezkian—All Baba to you—recognized here and there as the heavyweight wrestling champion, will get his chance tomorrow night to make it more or less unanimous.

The "Terrible Turk," who came from Armenia via the United States navy, to bounce the title from the head of the doughty Dick Shikat in Detroit 10 days ago, meets the German in a return bout in Madison Square Garden.

The New York State Athletic Commission says the winner will be the champ in its book. It declined to recognize All when he hurled Shikat from the ring in Detroit. Shikat is a top heavy favorite to flop All, regain his title and be matched with the winner of tonight's finish affair between the veteran Strangler Lewis and Hans Steinke, also scheduled in New York.

Jimmy McLarnin is in such tip-top shape for his 10 rounder with Tony Canzoneri in the Garden Friday night that his handler refused to let him box today and confined the Vancouver Celt to limbering up exercises.

"He's ready to go into the ring now," said manager Pop Foster. "Can't take a chance of having him go stale."

Canzoneri, meanwhile, whaled away at four sparring partners on his farm in upstate New York. He is in good trim, generally, but is working hard to improve his timing. McLarnin expects to weigh in at 144, which will give him a nine pound weight advantage over the lightweight king.

The odds now favor McLarnin at 8 to 5. Canzoneri and his manager, Sammy Goldman, can see nothing but a knockout win for the Italian.

Max Schmeling and Joe Louis, who clash in the summer season's first heavyweight brawl in the Yankee Stadium, June 16, look things stay at Lake Napanoch, and Lafayetteville, N. Y., getting ready for the hard work to come later.

Schmeling's camp will be formally opened Friday. Louis goes to Lakewood, N. J., May 15 to begin boxing.

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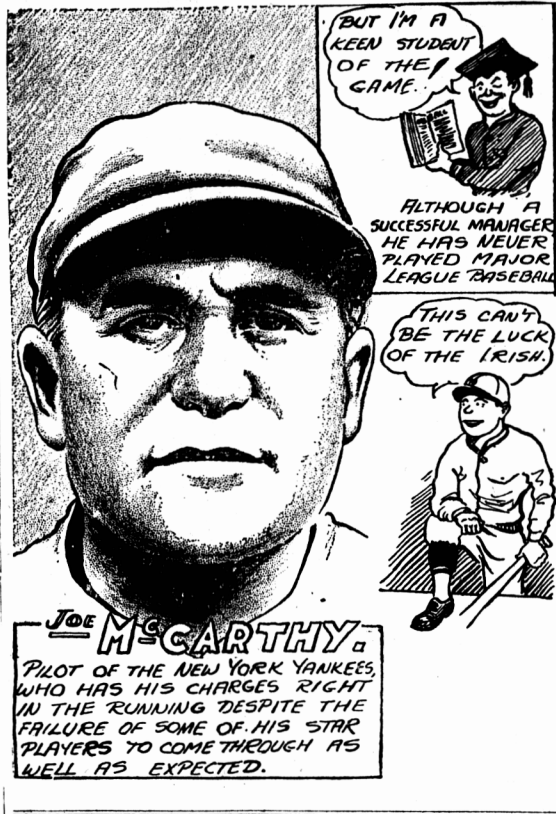

Binns And Leslie All Set For 10-round Scrap Tonight For Heavy Title

Can Bennie Binns, Maritime midweight champion take the measure of George Leslie 205 pound Sou'ris battler tonight at the Forum?

The above is a question that has been discussed long and often during the past six weeks and one that will be answered tonight at the Forum when the two fighters in the pink of condition, clash for the heavyweight boxing championship of the Island.

Not for years has a local fight stirred up such a controversy among boxing enthusiasts. In barber shops, on street corners and in restaurants the fight has been discussed from every angle. But still no favorite has been installed. Fans can't just seem to decide which way the fight will go. Leslie and Binns have both showed great stuff in training sessions. Both are fast, both hit hard and are primed to go the full ten rounds, if necessary, at top speed.

So there is the layout. From here it looks like a close, even battle very likely to get the full distance. But again the uncertainty that has surrounded it might see one boy or the other get an opening and end the scrap in quick order. But we hardly think so. Binns, possessing loads of courage is quietly determined to take his opponent's measure as he comes down for the fight in the best shape of his career. He won't predict a knockout but feels that his superior speed will enable him to gain the decision.

Leslie with his trainer and manager, "Big Jim" Pendergast arrived in the City yesterday. Trained to razor edge, hard as nails at 205 pounds the Island entry in Jack Dempsey's "White Hop" tournament in Toronto is eager for the going. He, like his opponent won't predict a knockout, but he is determined to win and says he will be in there throwing punches from the start.

A record crowd is in the offing. Rainy weather has not dampened the fans' enthusiasm to any great extent and already a big sale of tickets is reported. Proceeds of the scrap put on by the Labor Union all go to a charitable purpose.

In addition to the main bout a list of preliminaries is being staged that promises action every minute. Everything is in readiness at the Forum. The ringside seats have all been placed; a 16-foot ring has been erected and overhead, assuring the spectators ample light are three 500 candlepower lights that will illuminate the battle pit brightly as the remainder of the lights go out in the Forum and the

fighters shuffle to their respective corners to await the opening gong.
