Walter R. Shaw Addresses Meeting

Walter R. Shaw, opposition leader, in addressing the large gathering at the annual meeting of the 2nd Kings Progressive Conservative Association held Wednesday night in Morell, attacked the present government for boasting of how they could deal with Ottawa, and how they would raise our Provincial Grant by several millions of dollars.

"The chief cry from the Liberal Party throughout the province during the provincial election was, that you had to have two governments in line to get anything out of Ottawa. Now that Mr. Campbell is the premier, where is the millions of dollars that he suggested, that he could get from his political friends up there?" stated Mr. Shaw.

Mr. Shaw stated that he attended numerous conferences at Ottawa during his time and he found out that the people in Ottawa listen to a man who will lay his cards on the table and demand the rights his province deserves.

Speaking on the present administration Mr. Shaw noted that the Liberal hatchet men from the association are the people who are really controlling the government. "These are the men," he stated, "who are giving the orders as to who is to be hired and who is to be fired, and from where the government is to make their next purchase." "We would like to know just where Mr. Campbell is going to introduce his new attitude toward open tendering in all government departments," as he stated on May 20th," Mr. Shaw asked.

The meeting was chaired by District President, Roddy Pratt.

Other speakers on hand for the evening were: Walter Dingwell, M.L.A.; Leo Rossiter, M.L.A. who both thanked the people for the support they both received during the May 30th election; Dr. J.C. Stannett, M.L.A. 5th Kings; Preston McLure, M.L.A. 3rd Kings; James Lee, provincial party organizer; Albert Fogarty, Vice-President Kings County P.C. Association; Charles Campbell, provincial president Y.P.C. Association and Melvin McQuaid, M.P. Mr. McQuaid charged the federal government for assessing Parliament at such a time when we have a National problem like inflation upon us. He said, "We should be in Ottawa today dealing with this problem and trying to solve it, instead of sitting home in our ridings". Mr. McQuaid also noted, that we on P.E.I. are feeling the rise in cost of living every day. "This is very evident as we go to the grocery store, prices are being increased every day."

\$5,965 Theft

Four Suspects Are Arraigned

SUMMERSIDE — Four Summerside men appeared in county court here last evening before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald on charges of having possession of an instrument for housebreaking without lawful excuse. The charges were in connection with a break at Ellis' Store in New Glasgow yesterday morning.

The four accused are Robert Ernest Richard, Gary Wayne McKenna, Ivan Joseph Arsenault and Elmer Stephen Slavin, all of Summerside. They were arrested yesterday in Sherbrooke.

All four were remanded in custody to September 22 for a date to be set for trial, after electing to be tried by a judge.

A Kensington man, Wendell Ernest Mann, appeared on two charges: impaired driving and a second of obstruction of a police officer in the discharge of his duty. Both cases were adjourned to September 20 for a decision. George R. McMahon is crown prosecutor. The accused was represented by Neil R. MacLeod.

Minister Of Education Surprised With Statement

Surprise was expressed yesterday morning by the Hon. Gordon Bennett, minister of education, when confronted with a statement made by opposition leader, W.R. Shaw.

Mr. Shaw, speaking at a recent Conservative Association meeting is reported to have said that the cost of books at the School Supply has doubled since the Campbell government took office.

"The statement is of course completely untrue and deliberately misleading," stated Mr. Bennett.

He added "the citizens of the province are aware that a system of free school books for grades one to eight inclusive has already been put into effect by the Campbell government; but he noted, "any student not wishing to accept free text books, can procure the books at cost at the School Supply."

"The provision of text books for the pupils of grades nine to 12 normally operates in a different manner than for those in the elementary and intermediate grades. It is anticipated that a satisfactory scheme for the rental of books for students in the senior grades, involving an elaborate inventory and accounting system, will be in effect for the next school year."

In the meantime, Mr. Bennett continued, "these books are being generously subsidized by the government and are being provided to students at a price well below cost."

Mr. Bennett again expressed his great admiration for the members of his department.

In closing Mr. Bennett said "I am quite content to leave the question of school texts with the parents of this province and have them compare the policy and program of the Campbell Government after one month in office with that of the Shaw Government over a period of seven years."

Mayor Howard MacLean Chairs Council Meeting

GEORGETOWN — Mayor Howard S. MacLean presided over the regular monthly meeting of the Georgetown Town Council with Councillors, J.W. Lavers;

Mrs. Joan Currie, Malcolm MacLean, Joseph E. Johnson and John P. MacDonald in attendance.

The Police report showed a total of \$220 collected in fines for the month of August. It was reported that the town dump is being operated in a very satisfactory manner, under the recently adopted system of having the dump opened two days a week and a caretaker in attendance.

The Financial Report covered both the ordinary and capital accounts and bills amounting to \$405 were certified and others amounting to \$237 were approved for payment.

It was reported that all clay streets in the town has been recently scraped; that an old well that constituted a danger to the public and located at the corner of Kent Street and Water Street had been filled in.

CULVERTS INSTALLED
Culverts have been installed at the corner of Victoria and Richmond Streets. It was decided to authorize Councillor MacDonald to obtain a price on a conditioned engine for the Fire Department's Tank Truck and also to have the hose truck taken to Charlottetown for service, as it is still under warranty. Steps are being taken to repair the oil heater in the fire hall, which was damaged last spring in an explosion.

A street light will be installed on the corner of Gordon and East Streets. The amount of \$1773 has been received as a refund on the Winter Works and \$1000 of this amount was ordered used to retire a note and the balance to be placed in the capital expenditure account for Fire Department use. Progress payments on the sewage system installation amounting to \$9000 were approved, this makes the total amount to date of \$68,000.

Several applications were received for extension of the sewage system to certain streets. This matter was left over to the October meeting to enable the Council to accurately assess the total amount then committed on the sewage system, as the Council is not authorized on the guarantee loan to spend over \$90,000 on this project.

Other correspondence relating to a variety of matters of municipal government was read and dealt with. It was moved that three residences on the west end of Water Street be linked into the System after permission is obtained following the turn over of this system to the P.E.I. Industrial Corporation.

It was decided to place sixty loads of gravel on Grafton

QUESTION DISCUSSED

The question of sending representation from the Council to the annual meeting of the Mayors and Municipalities to be held in Summerside on September 30th and October 1st, was discussed.

It was stated at the meeting that no person may join his house sewage system to the existing lateral lines until the Council has been notified that the turn over from A.D.B. of their system to P.E.I. Industrial Corporation has taken place.

Then each and every property holder desirous of joining must first obtain a permit from the Town Clerk and only an authorized or qualified plumber may do the connecting, although the property holder is permitted to do the necessary digging from his foundation to the lateral line which goes to his property line.
