Mr. Ives, who is a son of Mr. and Mrs. George Ives, Charlottetown, (formerly of Dartmouth, N.S.) succeeds the Rev. Emery Harris, who recently became rector of Emmanuel Parish in Spryfield. While in Deacon's orders at present, his ordination to the priesthood will take place as soon as his priest's examinations have been completed.

Mr. Ives, who was a student at Prince of Wales College in Charlottetown before entering King's College in Halifax, served for a time on the staff of Radio Station CFDR in Dartmouth. As a divinity student he served for a time in the Parish of the Holy Spirit, Dartmouth, with duties in Lake Echo.

## Biggest Employment Opposition Is Said Unemployment Itself

One of the greatest factors working against the creation of new employment opportunities is unemployment itself.

Pointing out that in the economy of today most people take due advantage of the credit system in business, in buying automobiles, houses, household equipment etc. Colonel Laval Fortier, chief commissioner of the Unemployment Insurance Commission, said that not only does an unemployed person have to curtail his own standard of living, but that his actions have over-reaching adverse effects on the economy of the local region and on the economy of the whole country.

Addressing the annual meeting of the Atlantic Chapter of the International Association of Personnel in Employment Security held this weekend at St. Dunstan's University, Colonel Fortier said that though it is indeed essential to find work, to create new jobs and to prevent or solve unemployment problems, it is also essential to help unemployed workers according to their needs.

In addition to training and re-training the unemployed this also includes the payment of appropriate social insurance benefits.

Only such a full program can properly attack the problem of poverty and support a healthy economy.

**EFFECT ON ECONOMY**

With the experience of the last recession it can be said that, in addition to the preventing of undue hardships to the individual worker, the payments of Unemployment Insurance have had a salutary effect on the economy and were an important factor in preventing the last recession becoming a new depression.

Social financial assistance is, and should continue to be, our first line of domestic defence against want, he said.

Colonel Fortier discussed the Canadian vocational training program and the necessity of re-training created by automation. Using as an example the changes in banking procedures Colonel Fortier said that it has been estimated that without computers to process the flood of cheques that will be circulating in the U.S.A. by 1970, banks would have to hire all the American women between the ages of 21 and 45.

**NO HOLDS BARRED**

Dr. George Haythorne, deputy minister of labor, Ottawa, addressing the same group of IAPES, said that there will be no holds barred in the new approach to employment problems in Canada.

Because "we are now in a position where manpower policies are the key to our problems the National Employment Service must look in depth to its own work and objectives in its whole approach to full utilization of our manpower resources."

In this, his first visit to the regional office since the transfer of the NES to the department of labor, Dr. Haythorne said the problem of the inter-relationship of human resources and of industrial developments is a vital and necessary area for joint effort. "This is not just a provincial problem, but a national one."
