CITY COUNCIL MEETING

Matters Discussed Last Night—Not Very Much Done.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last evening. Mayor Warburton presided and all the members of the Board were in attendance excepting Councillor Whartley.

After routine business, a letter was read from the Superintendent of the Halifax School for the Blind acknowledging the \$150 voted by the Council towards that institution.

A communication from a number of residents of Richmond Street west and vicinity, setting forth the bad condition of a sewer in the neighborhood and asking the Council to take action, was referred to the Street Committee.

A memorial from a number of citizens asked that the Council contribute some thing towards the support of Mr. Wm. Mugford, a cripple, who is not in a position to help himself.

Councillor Hooper moved that \$20 be given towards the support of Mr. Mugford, but the motion was subsequently withdrawn it being understood that the Councillors would contribute the sum asked for out of their own pockets.

A letter was read from ex-Councillor Tanton complaining that the telephone pole nuisance in front of his premises had not been abated, and that the resolution of Council bearing upon the matter had not been carried out. The matter was referred to the Mayor for action.

In reply to Councillor Crabbe, Mayor Warburton said he had no information regarding the coming to Charlottetown of the Governor-General excepting what he had seen in the papers. He had spoken to the Lieutenant-Governor on the subject and he was also in the dark as to the reported visit.

Councillor Crabbe intimated that a condensed milk factory was about to be started here, and the promoters were looking about for a site. They thought the city lot at Spring Park a good one, and might purchase it if they could come to terms. He suggested the appointment of a committee to confer with the promoters of the enterprise.

The sale of the lot in question was favored by Councillors Horne and Lyons and opposed by Councillors Nicholson, Hooper and Taylor. The matter was allowed to drop.

Councillor Taylor's by-law amending the curfew law was given the six months hoist, after it had reached the committee stage. Councillor Hooper was in the chair. Councillors Taylor, Crabbe and Horne favored the passage of the by-law as submitted, Councillors Nicholson, Lyons and McCarron opposing it. The chairman gave his casting vote against the by-law.

A motion introduced by Councillor Crabbe that \$250 be voted towards the salary of a librarian for the proposed public library could not find a seconder. Meeting adjourned.

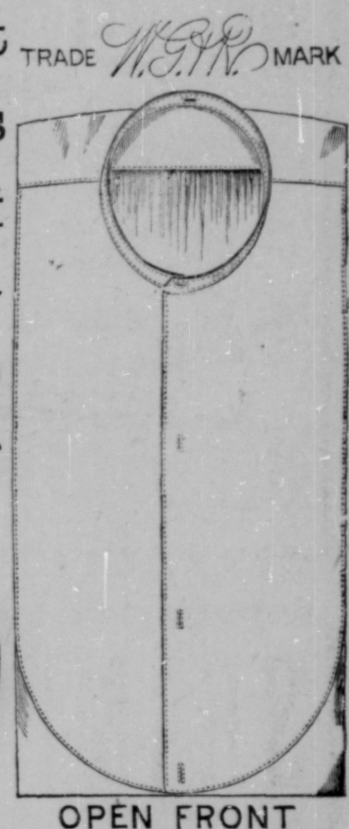

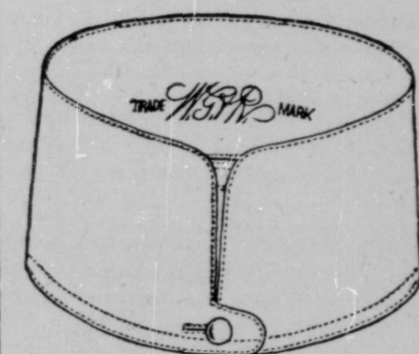
