ROAD REPORT - Paved highways are all bare on Prince Edward Island, and until the weather changes, summer driving conditions will prevail on pavements. Due to mild weather of the past few days, and the sudden freeze up last night, gravelled roads will be found cut-up and very rough. Route 1 - Summerside to Tignish - pavement bare; Route 2 - Charlottetown to Summerside and Borden - Clear pavement, gravelled portions between Traveller's Rest and Kensington, and Wilnot Bridge and Ross's Corner are rough and rutty; Route 2A - Charlottetown to Borden, via Bonshaw - most of this gravelled highway will be found rough; Route 3 - Charlottetown to Montague, Georgetown, and on Route 3 through Cardan, Dundas, Annandale to Rollo Bay - pavement clear, remaining distances on gravelled highways rutty and rough. Route 4 - Charlottetown to Wood Islands, Murray Harbour and Murray River to Montague to Eldon, remainder of gravelled road rough. Route 6 - Charlottetown to Souris - bare pavement all the way; Route 13 - Hunter River to Rustico - bare pavement most of the way, minimum of ice. Buses are running on schedule on all highways.

ARCHIBALD MATHESON

The many friends of Archibald Matheson heard with genuine regret of his death at his home at Milltown Cross on Dec. 19, 1950. The deceased was born at Milltown Cross nearly 82 years ago and was the son of the late Alexander and Margaret Martin Matheson. He is survived by a sister, Mrs. Mary J. MacDonald of Boston, Mass., and two brothers, D. A. Matheson of Chicago, Illinois, and the Rev. Dr. Malcolm A. Matheson, Huron, South Dakota. He was tenderly cared for during his last sickness by his niece, Mrs. James E. King and her husband. A largely attended funeral was held from his late residence on Dec. 21 at which the Revs. S. J. 14c Bread Trouble

We apologize to all our customers who were unable to obtain their favorite bread at our store last Friday and Saturday, and offer the following explanation.

In an earnest effort to reduce the cost of living by bringing to Charlottetown and District tables one of their daily necessities, - bread, the "staff of life", we are met by a definite movement to keep the price of bread UP on Prince Edward Island and are unable to obtain deliveries from certain bakeries until the sale of 14c bread is discontinued.

We have cooperated with an enterprising Island bakery in producing a 14c loaf. We have no intention of interfering with the price structure for the bread of any other bakery. We are courageous enough to continue to sell at the lower price, - even though we believe there was a movement under way to raise the price of bread to 18c.

Talking to Ottawa regarding this bread problem, it was interesting to discover that the general price for bread in Ottawa is 16c for a 24 ounce loaf, and that the prevailing price in Chain Stores for their own bread is 13c for a 24 ounce sliced loaf and 12c for a 24 ounce unsliced loaf. BREAD ON PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND IS ONLY REQUIRED TO BE A 20 OUNCE LOAF.

WE GUARANTEE

to the public that our bread is of the highest quality and that only the finest ingredients go into its manufacture; that it is a full-sized regular loaf, 20 ounces or over, sliced, and wax paper wrapped. We honestly believe there is no better bread being offered for sale on Prince Edward Island.

WE ALSO GUARANTEE that we are making a fair profit on this bread, and that the people who bake this bread are very happy about the profit they are receiving and maintain they are able to pay fair wages.

In the interest both of Co-operative Store members and of the consuming public in general, we are determined to continue the sale of 14c bread, and to check the possibility of a combine developing against the interest of the people on Prince Edward Island.
