R. H. McDonald, Esq., of St. Eleanor's  
read a paper on the necessity and im-  
portance of organizing a Farmers' Con-  
vention in the province. The paper contained  
many good suggestions and called out able  
addresses from Hon. A. Laird, Hon. W.  
Campbell, James Stavert and James Car-  
ruthers, Esquires.  
A society was then organized, and the  
following officers elected for the current  
year:—Hon. A. Laird, pres.; D. H. Mc-  
Donald, Esq., vice-pres.; H. A. Stewart,  
secy and treasurer; Executive Committee,  
R. H. McDonald, James McDougall, Lot  
14, William Ramsay, Park Corner, James  
Bentley, Margate, Arch. Gillis, Miscouche.  
A committee of three was then appointed  
to prepare a constitution for the society,  
which, after some amendments, was adopted  
by the meeting. The president, on taking  
the chair, delivered a good sensible  
address. The next meeting takes place in  
October.

**Business at Summerside.**  
The Pioneer reports:—"Large numbers  
of tourists were almost daily landed from  
the steamers. Of course many of those  
leave for various parts of the Island, but  
enough remain here to completely fill up  
the hotels. Storekeepers are having a  
steady trade—rolling out goods and raking  
in money. But they stand a good deal of  
that exercise. Carters are fully employed  
hauling goods, coal, building stone and the  
trunks of bums and tourists. A number  
of men at work laying the new sidewalk  
and a respectable crowd of stonecutters at  
work on the new building add to the hum  
of industry particularly on Water Street.  
In the west end the three shipyards in  
active operation make some stir in that  
section of the town. In this way no one  
thinks of calling Summerside a dull sleepy  
place. On Saturday and Monday Water  
Street was unusually busy, crowded with  
teams of various kinds most of the time."

**A New Cure For Freckles.**

coupled too, with his extraordinary ap-

**CURRENT NOTES.**  
Lord Carnarvon has written to the Lon-  
don papers favoring a protectorate over  
New Guinea.  
The earnings of the Canadian Pacific  
Railway for the first week of July were:  
1883, \$133,000; 1882, \$61,000; increase,  
\$72,000.  
Mr. Braud'laugh announces his intention  
of again appealing to his constituency in  
case of his being again refused permission  
to take his seat.  
A gentleman in good circumstances in  
Montreal is being prosecuted by the local  
Society to Prevent Cruelty to Children, for  
boasting a son of his own.

The Government of Quebec have made a  
number of other reductions in the Civil  
Service salaries, amounting to a saving of  
\$35,000, or \$80,000 in all.  
The officers of Her Majesty's Customs  
seized on Monday morning about 20,000  
cigars from a prominent importing house in  
St. John for alleged under valuation.  
A Chicago man claims to have invented  
a buggy with but one wheel, after the  
fashion of a bicycle. He says it is safer  
and goes faster than the ordinary vehicle.  
Queen Victoria has invited the celebrated  
painter, Prof. Von Angell of Vienna, to  
visit England and make a life-size portrait  
of her, to be presented to the German  
Emperor on the twenty-fifth anniversary of  
his assumption of the Regency of Prussia.

Another sensational performance by a  
green trotter is reported from Michigan.  
At East Saginaw last week the chestnut  
stallion Duquesne, owned by Paul Hacke,  
of Pittsburg, won the second heat of the  
2.34 race in 2.21, and on the following day  
captured the race. It was his first public  
effort, and his driver, Patrick Higgins, had  
previously driven but two races. Duquesne  
is eight years old and was bred in Philadel-  
phia.

New York City statistics show the inter-  
esting fact that the number of persons pay-  
ing taxes on personal property has decreased  
from 11,666 last year to less than 10,000  
this year. This is a small number for a  
population of a million, but what is equally  
significant is the fact that the number pay-  
ing this tax has been decreasing for years,  
though the population and personal estate  
of the city have been increasing. Political  
economists will be apt to say the figures  
show that direct taxation on personal prop-  
erty soon fails; that the unequal incidence  
of the tax, and its evident injustice, unite  
with the ease with which it can be  
evaded in making any laws regulating it  
exceedingly defective. All attempts yet  
made have failed to materially improve the  
system, or to bring about more equitable  
taxation.

**Sporting Notes.**  
A carload of 6,000 wild pigeons was re-  
cently forwarded to Texas from Missouri  
for a shooting match.  
Lowndes, the English wheelman, has just  
made ten miles in 32½ minutes on a tricycle,  
thus breaking the bicycle record.  
The fifth heat for the Geddes and Har-  
vey medal was run to-night, C. G. Millard  
coming in first, J. Gordon second, and W.  
Craig third.  
George Fulljames and Jimmy Murray  
have failed to come terms for a fight.  
Fulljames wanted four months to train.  
Murray would not wait longer than six  
weeks.

M. Clancy, of Toronto, writes that he  
will match Gus Garruthers to run J. War-  
wick 100 yards for \$200 aside or more, and  
he will meet Warwick at Frank Martin's  
King street west, at five o'clock on Sat-  
urday afternoon, to arrange articles.  
A Bull-do street car conductor named  
Waters has challenged Denis Gallagher, a  
gentleman who made a favorable impres-  
sion in the recent wrestling tournament,  
to wrestle collar-and-elbow, catch-as-  
catch-can, and side hold for \$100 and  
gate money. The challenge has been ac-  
cepted.

In his late second heel-and-toe match  
with Edwards, for the championship of  
Australia, Dan O'Leary was in good condi-  
tion. He covered 100 miles the first day,  
90 miles the second day, 83 the third, 82  
the fourth, 63 the fifth, and 38 miles the  
sixth day. His total score was 459 miles,  
while that of Edwards was 466 miles, 2  
laps. O'Leary weakened towards the end  
of the walk, and it was evident that his  
best days were gone. The attendance was  
big, 22,100 people paying gate-money.  
Hiram Stoddard is the name of the Syr-  
acuse, N. S., man whom Richard K. Fox  
is to take in hand, and back against John  
L. Sullivan. Stoddard was born in Fulton,  
Oswego County, twenty-seven years ago.  
He was known there as a quiet, unassuming  
young man, except when under the influ-  
ence of liquor, and then he was a bad one  
to wake up. His employment was in the  
railroad line. Afterwards he became  
a steambot hand in New York harbor,  
and four years ago he settled in Syracuse.  
He is six feet tall, and weighs 195 pounds.

James Wylie, the Herd Laddie, will make  
a tour in Canada, previous to leaving  
America for good. He leaves New York  
for Ottawa on Monday, and writes:—"Be-  
fore leaving I again desire to state that I  
am ready to play any man in the United  
States or Canada for the championship of  
the world. The match to be for \$250 or  
\$500 a side, and to take place either in  
New York, Boston or Philadelphia. The  
challenge will remain open on above terms  
for sixty days; after which, if unanswered,  
I will complete my arrangements for return-  
ing to Scotland."
