TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The British Political Crisis. LONDON, June 20. Both Houses of Parliament adjourned to Tuesday. Negotiations between Conservatives and Liberal leaders have not sufficiently progressed to enable either side to make a definite statement. Mr. Chamberlain and followers refuse to promise not to obstruct the Tories, and the Marquis of Salisbury refuses to allow the re-distribution of Seats Bill to pass the final stages and become law, on the ground that if he did so, and the constituencies being abandoned, and the new law not operative until November, he could not appeal to the country till then. He demands a definite pledge from the Liberal leaders. The latter cannot hold their followers. So, consequently, a dead lock prevails.

The C. P. R. Resolution Debate. OTTAWA, June 20. In the House of Commons, yesterday, the discussion on the Canada Pacific Railway resolutions was continued. McCarthy made a brilliant speech in favor of the resolutions. He was followed by Mr. L. H. Davies, P. E. I., who said that the amendment moved by Cameron meant repudiation. He denounced the policy of making deceptive statements about the country and the Canada Pacific Railway in order to allure British capital.

The Opposition amendment was defeated by 100 against 51. The main motion was carried, and the House went into committee on the resolutions.

The Short Line Railway. OTTAWA, June 20. Picton and Cape Breton M. P.'s endorsed the offer of Messrs. Kamper and Dhartherie to complete the line of railway from Oxford to New Glasgow and extend it to Louisburg. They have made arrangements with Paris bankers to get an advance of \$2,200,000 for the immediate payment of the old debts contracted by Norvin Green's company. They will complete the whole line, providing the Government will so arrange the subsidies already voted as to make it \$73,471 yearly, and payable to the order of the bankers.

The Earl of Chudleigh. LONDON, June 20. Sir Stafford Northcote has been made a Peer with the title Earl of Chudleigh. The Queen is said to object to Randolph Churchill being in the new Cabinet.

The Northwest Rebellion. PRINCE ALBERT, June 20. Evidence is accumulating that Hon. Lawrence Clarke, Hudson Bay Company Factor, was one of the most prominent instigators of the rebellion.

Frightful Colliery Accident. LONDON, June 20. One hundred and forty-four men were killed in a colliery explosion near Manchester yesterday. Only twenty-two bodies have, so far, been recovered.

Burned to Death. NORTH SYDNEY, June 20. Mrs. Gillis, aged 70, was burned to death at Gabarus a few nights ago. The other inmates of the house had a narrow escape.

The Tories Don't Want War. LONDON, June 20. The Marquis of Salisbury writes an open letter ridiculing the idea that the Tories want war with Russia.

Aquatic. BUFFALO, June 20. Hanlan and Teemer have signed articles for a five mile boat race in August, September or October.
