7. This Agent shall be authorised to advance, in part payment of passage, £2 for every adult, and £1 for every person under years of age, and of age to be employed.

The Society will forward to their Agents instructions applicable to every class of Emigrants, whether designing to go to Land, and whether possessed of small or larger capital; and the necessary information for artisans, and all others, with any parties the Society will be happy to correspond, it will be their particular aim to contract for and facilitate passage of all descriptions.
