

Local and Other Items.

New Goods.—A fine line of fancy goods were opened to-day at the Diamond Book-store.

ROOF BLISS OFF.—The roof of the new Presbytery in course of erection at Hampton, N. B., was blown off by the gale last night.

WATERWORKS.—It is expected that the laying of the water pipes will be completed about the 15th October. The pumping station at Three Mile Run is an attraction to visitors.

RAILWAY MENS' CONVENTION.—Rev. Mr. Meikle and the Railway Delegates arrive this evening. Convention opens in Y. M. C. A. Hall to-morrow at 10 a. m. Welcome meeting at 7.30 p. m.

CHURCH OPENING.—The new Methodist church at Montague Bridge will be opened on Sunday, Oct. 14th, when the Rev. John Read of Charlotteville, will preach at 10.30 a. m., and 6.30 p. m., and Rev. W. H. Spencer at 3 p. m.

SCHOONER WRECKED. We learn that a vessel, supposed to be a schooner, was wrecked on the Tryon Bar, off Victoria, during the storm last night. It is supposed that all hands are lost. A boat went out to her this morning, but whether it succeeded in reaching the vessel we have been unable to learn.

THE HOLIDAY.—The public schools gave the pupils a holiday to-day. Early this morning adventurous youths of a nautical turn of mind were to be seen preparing rafts, punts, and small boats of all description in which to witness the regatta. THE NORTHERN LIGHT'S SUCCESSOR.—The plans of the new steamer for winter service between this Island and the mainland are on view in the windows of John Newson's Furniture store. They represent a neat and comfortable boat, and those who travel in winter will rejoice to know that she will have considerably more and better passenger accommodation than her predecessor.

ROBBERY.—The audacity of the gang of burglars who appear to have regularly established themselves in our midst is becoming intolerable. Last night they entered the boot store of John McIntyre, Grafton Street, near Hillsborough, and made a clean sweep of the premises, together with \$15 in cash. The authorities should at once adopt the necessary extreme measures to run down these bare-faced thieves.

POOR LO!—An intoxicated Indian was prowling around at the foot of Queen Street several days ago, indulging in a mixture of French, Irish and native. His sentences were, "Parle vous. Je jabsers me velly drunk," a repeated recital of which kept the on-lookers in merriment, although the scene was a sad one. It is well known that intoxicants infuriate our red brethren, and if those who are mean enough to give them liquor could be detected, a severe punishment should be meted out.

Personal.

The Prince of Wales has accepted an invitation to visit the King of Roumania.

President Carnot has granted the Grand Cordon of the Legion of Honor to the Malagasy Queen.

King Milan has formally complained to King Charles of Roumania of his having received Queen Natalie at Bucharest, declaring the act to have been insulting to himself.

Rev. E. Whitman and family, who have since the fire been living at the Franklin House in the suburbs of the city, have removed to the DesBrisay property, on Hillsboro Street near Euston.

Mr. Gladstone is greatly incensed at Mr. Chamberlain's recent utterances, and has requested Mr. John Morley to prepare a reply to the statements, assertions and charges made by the Radical leader.

The Rome correspondent of the Times says that Cardinal Moran is not on a secret mission from the Vatican to Ireland, but that his visit is entirely connected with the recruiting of priests for Australia and other points.

The Rev. F. J. Jayne, M. A., Vicar of Leeds and Canon of Ripon, has just been appointed new Bishop of Chester, in the room of the Right Reverend Dr. Stubbs, translated to Oxford. Mr. Jayne is only 42 years of age, and after his consecration he will be the youngest prelate in England.

The "silent Von Moltke" isn't at all silent at home. He is, on the contrary, a charming, lively and amiable companion. He is very fond of the wife of his nephew, who presides over his household, and of her children. He loves what and roses, and of these flowers cultivates a great variety.

It is said that Nova Scotians are ubiquitous and are to be found in every part of the habitable globe. It may not be generally known that Stanley, the great African explorer, has, as second in command, Lieut. W. E. Stairs, of the royal engineers, a son of the late John Stairs, of Halifax. Lieut. Stairs is about 26 years of age; he was educated at the Military College at Kingston, Ont., and was selected for the position from over 250 applicants.

Since the murder of Major Bartolotte, who was first officer under Stanley, Lieut. Stairs has probably been promoted to his place. The anxiety with which Nova Scotians, in common with the whole civilized world, await news of the safety of this expedition, will be increased by the knowledge that one of our own people is numbered among the party.—Dybbi Courier.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA Sept. 26. A thrilling and appalling scene occurred at the exhibition to-day. A balloon ascension being a portion of the programme, a number of citizens crowded around the balloon during its inflation, and several were assisting in steadying it when it suddenly rose carrying with it a young man named Wensley. As he had clung by his hands to a small rope, he found it impossible to retain his hold, and when about 1,000 feet in the air he lost his grasp and fell to the ground within a few hundred yards of the 5,000 spectators, who were stricken by the sad spectacle.

Despite the desperate efforts of the Grit Rielle constitution smashers, Lepine has been elected for Montreal East by a majority of 700.

Fight at Suakin.

SUAKIN, Sept. 26.

Rebels to-day attacked the water fort, but were repulsed with a severe loss by the heavy artillery fire of the British. One British gunner was killed. The gunboats continued firing into the rebel camp. Deserters report that there is much sickness in the camp.

Cholera has broken out in Khartoum. Advice by the German Planters' Company from Zanzibar state that the rising extend along the whole coast, and that the Arabs and blacks have united. A plantation at Lewa, belonging to the company, has been twice attacked, but each time have been repulsed. Several officials of the German-African Company have been murdered.

Terrible Storm.

BOSTON, Sept. 26.

The most terrible gale and rain storm of the season prevailed along the New England coast from midnight last night till noon to-day. At some points the storm was the worst for 20 years. Many buildings were blown down. There was vast damage to trees and fences, and much minor damage to shipping; but no important wrecks are yet reported, though many are expected.

Yellow Fever.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Sept. 26.

One hundred and three new cases of yellow fever are reported in the past 24 hours, 30 white and 73 colored. The deaths reported number seven. The hopeful feeling continues, and it is believed that the number of cases and the mortality will now steadily decrease.

Judge Armstrong's Trial.

MONTREAL, Sept. 26.

The trial of Judge Armstrong, for libelling the Hochelaga Cotton Factory as President of the Labor Commission, was concluded this afternoon, when the jury returned a verdict of "not guilty."

Salt—Price Increased.

HALIFAX, Sept. 26.

The price of salt has increased 15 cents per hoghead. There are 5,000 hogheads in store here.
