Can Investigate Aggression Charges

OTTAWA, July 19 - Mato A. Jaksic, Yugoslav minister to Canada, said representatives of "peace-loving" Canadian organizations as well as "other prominent persons" will be welcomed by his government in Yugoslavia if they wish to investigate charges that his country has "aggressive intentions."

Business Spotlight

President Truman's message to Congress Wednesday is being awaited by business men for its indication of the shape of things to come.

It is not considered likely that a real wartime-controlled state will come at once, but nevertheless there is forecast of some controls. Two factors may bring them faster, than would otherwise have been the case.

These are a considerable rush by Americans to stock up on things which might become scarce in wartime, and steep boosts in commodity prices.

Whatever develops Wednesday, controls once started can spread rapidly and soon find their way across the border.

Among things predicted in Washington are controls over steel, curbs on consumer credit, and possibly a tax increase.

In the meantime, if there should be a widespread war, American observers see United States industry in a much better position than when it faced the Second World War.

Sam Dawson of The Associated Press comments:

"Industry, from the largest to the smallest company, waits word expected soon from Washington as to when it is to be mobilized. The question is: if industrial mobilization is needed at this time, is it to come all at once or piecemeal?"

"Industries are trying to guess: 1. Which of their employees, from the unskilled to the executives, will be called into service, and how they are to be replaced; 2. Whether their company's production is to be controlled, their raw materials rationed, the type of goods they make changed; and 3. Whether price controls are to be clamped on the materials they buy, and whether their inventories are to be regulated or confiscated."

"But once the uncertainty is over, leaders in almost all industries feel they are ready this time to do a bigger war production job, and in many cases a quicker one."

"The Federal Reserve Board estimated its industrial production index reached 197 just before the Reds struck Korea. This topped the previous post-war peak of 195 in the fall of 1948. And it means that the country's industrial output is 197 per cent of its 1933-39 pre-war average."

What can be said of the production powers of the United States can certainly be said also of those of Canada, for per capita Canada has probably increased her production powers more than her neighbor.

KIRKENES, Norway - (CP) - Reconstructed and modernized iron mines in this Northern Norway area are expected to produce at the rate of 500,000 tons of ore for export by the end of 1951. The mines were badly damaged during the Second World War.
