What Alan Dale Says of "A Bachelor's Honeymoon"

Note—"Alan Dale" is the critic of one of New York's leading newspapers. Managers fear him and authors dread him, for they well know that what he says is read with the keenest interest by the general public as they fully recognize that Alan Dale writes exactly as he feels, regardless either of the pocketbooks or feelings of managers or authors.

At the end of the second act of "A Bachelor's Honeymoon," at Hoyt's theater, last night, John Stapleton, the author came modestly forward and bowed his thanks to the audience. His action was graceful, but unnecessary. He owed nothing at all to the audience, but on the other hand, those who were at Hoyt's are greatly in debt to Mr. John Stapleton. He has written a brilliantly clever farce. "A Bachelor's Honeymoon" is funny from the rise of the curtain on the first act, until it falls at the end of the play. There is not a dull moment in it; the action is brisk, the dialogue witty, and the situations deliciously funny.

Benjamin Bachelor, a widower, with two grown daughters, who, by the way are twins, marries Miss Brown, who is known on the stage as Juno Joyce. He has kept the young woman in ignorance of his paternity. A clause in Bachelor's father's will cut him off without a penny if he marries against the wishes of a spinster sister. In order to have his bride win the approval of this sister, he introduces her into the household as his housekeeper.

There is no delay in starting the story. This much is told in half a dozen sentences at the beginning of the play. From this point complications follows complication. The plot is intricate, but not involved. It is clear throughout.

At the end of the first act it would seem that it were not possible to further complicate matters, and the act to come must of necessity drag. It does nothing of the sort. It gallops along at neck-break speed.

There are a certain number of themes upon which broad farces can be handled, but throughout the play sudden turns and twists come upon one which are as startling as they are grateful.

Of course the two daughters and the spinster walk in on Bachelor just as he is beginning to enjoy his Honeymoon. The party is followed by two young men who are in love, of course with the two daughters. A private detective who is in search of the actress serves the author's purpose well in bringing about the necessary complications. One of the lovers has formerly been engaged to Juno Joyce, another is willing to be engaged to any one who will marry him in a hurry. Both believe themselves bound to the young woman. She encourages both. They wish to fight a duel with Bachelor. He accepts their challenge—but why go on. It would take columns to tell of all the complications. It is enough to say the play is very funny, that it is well made, well put on the stage, and acted with verve and ability, and an excellent company.

A VALUABLE CARGO.—The steamer City of Glen, McNEVIN, took from here, on her last trip, 1,518 cases of lobsters, valued at \$15,300, besides 200 bags of oats and potatoes and some small freights. Of the lobsters, 500 cases were shipped by Mr. R. T. Holman, to St. Petersburg, 93 cases by the same exporter to London, 882 cases by Messrs. Woodman Bros., Alberton to London, and the balance to the same city by other parties.—Summerside Agriculturalist.

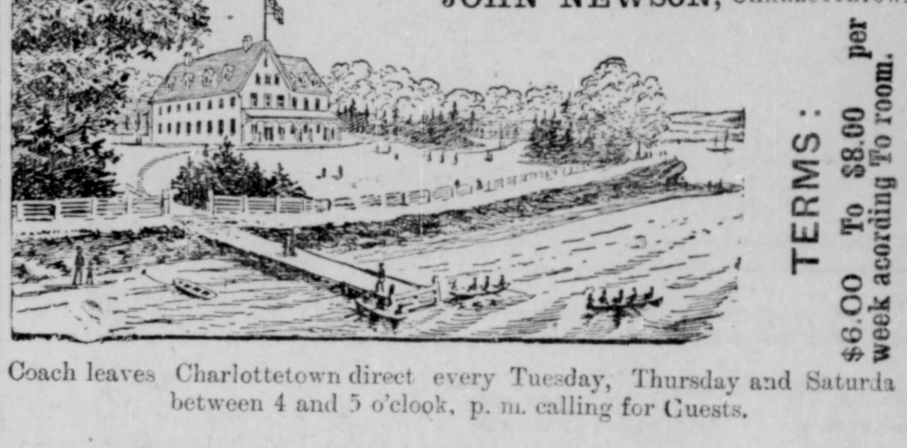
