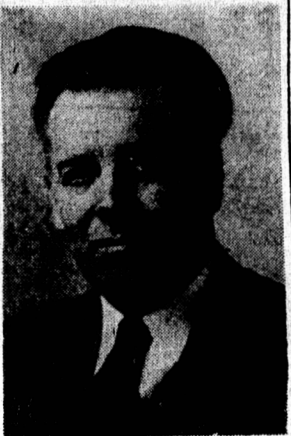

DAWSON, Y.T., Sept. 25 (CP) - The capital of the Yukon is setting up a howl that echoes through the dusty, empty saloons of the '90ers.

The word has got around that Ottawa intends to move the capital from Dawson to Whitehorse, some 250 air miles south of here.

At a recent meeting, Mayor Howard Firth and his three aldermen threatened to resign if the seat of Yukon's government were moved.

From a roaring boom town of 26,000 at the turn of the century when it was the centre of the Klondike gold rush, Dawson today is a village of a little more than 1,000.

40-mile gap, the bulk of the North Korean army, which numbered 15 divisions—possibly 140,000 men—three weeks ago, would be trapped south of the 38th parallel they crossed three months ago.

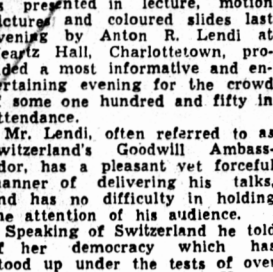

TORONTO, Sept. 25 (CP) - Lt. Col. John Bayne Maclean, one-time \$7-a-week reporter who founded the Maclean-Hunter Publishing Company Ltd., died today.

He considered himself first, last and always a reporter. He said in 1947, when his company marked its 60th anniversary: "I am not yet a journalist or a writer of fine English."

Col. Maclean was born Sept. 26, 1882, at Clief, near Guelph, Ont., the son of a Scottish-born Presbyterian minister, Rev. Andrew Maclean. In later years he went to great pains to keep the Clief name and schoolhouse in good repair.

At 20 he came to Toronto to work for the old Toronto Globe. He became a commercial editor with the Empire and later financial editor of the Mail.

The Canadian Grocer, which he founded in 1887, was the first trade paper published in Canada and the first of a group of 28 trade papers which formed the backbone of Col. Maclean's business. Perhaps his best-known publication is Maclean's Magazine.

Col. Maclean was a founder of the Canadian Red Cross Society and in 1906-07 a vice-president of the Military Institute. He declined an appointment to the Senate in 1913.

C. N. R. Places Orders For Eight Diesel Engines

MONTREAL, Sept. 26 - The Canadian National Railways has placed an order for eight diesel electric road locomotives with the Montreal Locomotive Works at a cost of approximately \$1,500,000.

In announcing the new order here today, E. A. Bromley, vice president, purchases and stores, said that it brings the total cost of new equipment, including locomotives and other items of rolling stock ordered by the Canadian National during 1950 to \$13,700,000.

The eight new diesels, each of 1600 horse power, will be delivered early next year. They will consist of four "A" units which are lead units with engineers control cab on the streamlined nose, and four "B" units, commonly known as boosters which pair up behind the lead units. They can, however, be operated also in higher multiples of three and four to provide greater power for heavier loads. They are destined for main line freight service with the railway.

Discusses Work Of Vegetable Graders



Grading, packaging, marking, and marketing of Canada's fruits and vegetables is a fascinating business which interests a great many men in the Dominion Department of Agriculture and keeps them in this service, said Mr. R. E. Robinson, Ottawa, in his address to the Charlottetown Rotary Club yesterday.

There are about forty men employed in this branch of the department in Prince Edward Island under the direction of Mr. C. E. Shaw. In this Province most of the men are qualified in potatoes and turnips although the department can supply men to inspect and grade any fruit or vegetable grown in Canada, said Mr. Robinson.

There are quite a few other sources of vitamin C, said the speaker, but the heavy advertising done by the grading process has given their fruit a tremendous market. Lemon, lime, and apple juice are good sources, while the cabbage is a wonderful supplier of this vitamin. The fruit containing the highest amount of vitamin C is the blackberry.
