CONTRACT BRIDGE

QUIZ

You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has been:
West North East South
1♣ 1♥ 2♠ ?

What would you now bid with each of the following four hands?

- ♠A78 ♣Q84 ♢KQ95 ♣A782
- ♠AK85 ♣852 ♢6 ♣8543
- ♠K98 ♣75 ♢KQJ72 ♣KQ10
- ♠KJ87 ♣KQ83 ♢AJ952 ♣

1. Three hearts. There is a possibility of game, depending on how good partner's overall is. All that can be done at this point is to invite him to go on. The one heart overall ordinarily is based on a hand which would not qualify as an opening bid, its primary purpose being to compete for a part score.

2. Two hearts. Since overalls are seldom made with four-card suits, hearts must be regarded as a playable trump suit. The raise to two hearts, even with

only three small trumps as support, is to be preferred to a two spade bid. Hearts are known to be playable; spades may not be. A two spade bid would represent a better game suit, and would at the same time tend to deny heart support.

3. Two notrump. This bid indicates stronger game-going potential than a two diamond bid would. As usual, the representation of strength takes precedence over the identification of distribution. A two diamond bid would be read as simply a competitive call for part score purposes; the two notrump bid is a direct try for game. With 15 high card points facing a vulnerable overall, and two club stoppers, game cannot be far away.

4. Three clubs. The cuebid in the opponents' suit represents a powerful hand and, by implication, guarantees heart support. Several purposes are simultaneously served by the cuebid. Partner is not only informed a game is in prospect, but is also alerted to the possibility of a slam.

But the best practical reason to bid three clubs, rather than jump directly to four hearts, is to forestall a bidding problem that might arise later. Thus, if four hearts were bid directly, it would be difficult to know what to do if the opponents bid five clubs. By showing the club void, this decision is transferred to partner to solve.
