Notes and Comments.

In Nova Scotia the estimated expenditure of the Government in the current year is \$671,528.73, and revenue \$673,222.39.

The Montreal Gazette remarks that after the Rothschilds had hinted their opposition to the latest Russian financial project, the Jewish persecution in the Czar's dominions are reported to have suddenly ceased. Russia is not prepared to go to war with Europe's money bags.

The financial position of the country continues to improve. The Finance Minister is able to announce at the end of the tenth month of the fiscal year a surplus of over six million dollars, the figures being: Revenue to April 30th, \$31,352,287; expenditure, \$25,303,610. The revenue last month was \$3,177,002. The expenditure for April was \$2,595,752, nearly \$200,000 more than in the corresponding month last year.

Although the Spanish government has maintained the utmost reserve in regard to the treaty, even refusing to communicate it to the Cuban deputies, information from a reliable source confirms the report that coal, petroleum, machinery and fats will be admitted free into Cuba and Porto Rico, and the present duty on flour will be reduced one-half, in exchange for the free admission into the United States of sugar, coffee and cocoa.

The Canadian cattle shippers are jubilant over the news from England that Mr. Chaplin, British Minister of Agriculture, intends to maintain the embargo on cattle shipped from the United States ports, whilst admitting those from the Dominion. This means that Canadian cattle can enter the interior alive, but that animals from the United States must be slaughtered at the port of entry.

The Mohammedans of India have begun mission work in England, and they have established one society at Liverpool, the president of which is a prominent English barrister of that city.

City Council.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last evening. In the absence of Mayor Haviland, who is ill, Councillor Byrne presided.

After the transaction of some routine business, Councillor Morris submitted a proposition from the lessee of Queen's Wharf, offering to hand it over to the city on condition that he be not charged rent after the 31st December, 1890, and be allowed for the scales and scale-house erected thereon by him.

Councillor Horne thought the summer was a bad time for wharf building, and that the work could be done much cheaper next winter.

Councillor Morris explained that the Council could not get possession of the wharf until now, and said that the summer was the best time to do the work of repairing.

Councillor Taylor moved that the proposition of the lessee of Queen's Wharf be accepted, upon his paying the amount due by him to the city, for rent up to the 31st December, after deducting a certain sum for the weigh-scales and house.

Councillor Donse seconded the motion, which was carried.

The matter of repairing the wharf stands over until next meeting.

A letter was read from the secretary of the School Board asking for one thousand dollars on account of estimates for the year to meet current expenses.

On motion the request was ordered to be granted.

A memorial was read from Mr. John Bolger, informing the Board that he had consented to the sinking of a well in his cellar for the draining of the streets in his neighborhood, in connection with which works he had incurred expenses, and asked that he be re-imbursed to the extent of \$45 by the city.

Mr. Bolger was heard at the Bar in support of his memorial, which was referred to the Street Committee.

Council adjourned until Wednesday forenoon at eleven o'clock.

Charlottetown Athletic Association

THERE was a large attendance of members at the meeting of the Charlottetown Athletic Association held in the Stipendiary Magistrate's Courtroom last night. The meeting was called to order by Mr. Lewis Carvell, who was appointed Chairman. Mr. A. H. McNeill acted as Secretary.

Canada's Pride

A VANCOUVER, B. C., PASTOR REFERS TO THE ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE C. P. R.

(Vancouver, B. C., Telegram.) The popular pastor of Homer Street Methodist Church, Rev. Robert R. Maitland, preached last night to a large audience on "Current Events." In the course of his sermon he referred to the coming of the Empress of India as follows: The eyes of Europe, Asia and America are upon this young city at the present time. It would seem very true for me to emphasize the anomalous prominence which this five-year-old city has attained, it has been so often done. The entrance of the Empress of India marks a new era, not only in Vancouver's history, but in the history of the Dominion and the whole British empire.

News Notes.

The Czarevitch is now at Hong Kong. Brooklyn bridge has been made free to foot passengers.

Sir John Robertson, formerly Premier of Victoria, is dead.

The Bank of England has advanced its rate of discount from 3 1/2 to 4 per cent.

The Dibley team will sail for England on June 21st by the Sarnia of the Dominion Line.

Over one million dollars worth of property was destroyed in the Pittsburg conflagration.

The arrested anarchists at Rome have confessed that they were paid by Landi to create disorder on May 1.

A despatch from Cherbourg announces that a French torpedo boat has been sunk off that port. There was no loss of life.

Advices from Pennsylvania state that the anthracite coal trade has suddenly improved. Unexpectedly large orders have been placed, and a very active demand is assured.

All the Italians in Boston were invited to attend a mass meeting at Faneuil hall on Monday night for the purpose of forming a society for the elevation of the poorer and ignorant class of Italians, who it is proposed to teach respect for and obedience to the laws. The projectors also state that in time they will ask the city to make laws to prohibit rag and garbage picking, hand-organ playing, etc.

MOTHER COO'S PROPHECIES.—Truro still stands, notwithstanding Mrs. Coo's prediction of its destruction by fire on the 8th. A barn was burned on that day, however, and it is said created quite an excitement among the Truroians. It is said Mrs. Coo has made a prophecy to the effect that on the 13th of the present month there will be an accident on the I. C. R. attended with loss of life. The place where the accident will occur is at the McDonald gulch in the vicinity of River Dings on the C. B. branch. The gulch is spanned by iron trestle work and is a dangerous looking place. There are to be 80 people on the train, 78 of whom are to pass in their checks.

POLICE COURT.—This morning, one Sunday drunk was fined \$6 or twenty days, and the case of another drunk was adjourned until Thursday for further evidence. A case of malicious injuries to property and two assault cases were also adjourned until the same day, owing to the illness of one of the litigants.

It is pleasing to hear that Rev. V. E. Harris has returned to Amherst, renewed in health and quite refreshed after his holiday trip to England.

The portraits of Capt. Verney, M. P., who has gone to jail in England, make him look like a very pious Psalm singer. And what is more, he posed in that role until he was found out.

The Princess of Wales, who is an experienced photographer, has sent a large selection of her best productions to the great international exhibition to be opened next month in Vienna under the patronage of a fashionable club of amateur photographers, presided over by the Archduchess Marie Theresas.

The announcement which has been made in some American papers to the effect that "the father of Rudyard Kipling" is about to publish a book on India, recalls the fact that the gentlemen in question knew a great deal about that country long before his son saw the light of the world. It is related of the late Hon. Alfred Conkling, who served his state long and faithfully, that he was on one occasion introduced to an audience as "the father of Roscoe Conkling." The indignation of the old gentlemen was extreme, and advancing to the front of the platform with blazing eyes, he proceeded to tell his hearers what he had done, and the honors which the people had conferred upon him, and then explained: "Now, in mine old age, God pity me, I am nothing but the father of Roscoe Conkling."

Before the funeral of the late Hon. R. P. Haythorne the remains were laid in the hotel drawing room, where many friends took their last view of the body. The features were placid as though asleep. Among those who paid their last mark of respect was Hon. Alex. McKenzie. A handsome floral wreath laid on the coffin, the gift of personal friends in the sons' and the hotel. Hon. C. H. Tupper was present representing the ministry. The pall-bearers were the Hon. R. W. Scott, Hon. Mr. Prowse, Hon. Mr. McInnes, Hon. Mr. Wark, Hon. Mr. Gowan and Hon. Mr. Grant. The senators and members of Commons from this Island acted as chief mourners.

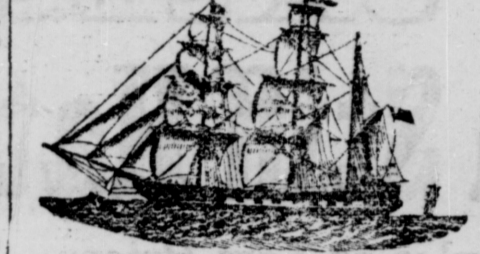
