

# C.M.A. President Asks Realistic Tariff Policy

DRUMMONDVILLE, Que. (CP) — A realistic tariff policy as a sure for Canada's growing pains was asked for Friday night by T. A. Rice of Hamilton, president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association.

Addressing the annual dinner of the association's Drummondville branch, Mr. Rice said "the policy which our government has been pursuing has had the effect of increasing imports substantially and these increased imports have caused, and are continuing to cause, serious disturbance to our economy, particularly to our secondary industries."

"These secondary industries, or certainly a great number of them, depend for their continued existence and prosperity on the domestic market and, with the present accent on imports — an accent which has given Canada the dubious honor of being the world's largest importer of manufactured goods — present trade policies could easily work decisive harm to many industries."

Mr. Rice's remarks were contained in a text released to the press in advance of delivery.

### SEEK NEW TARIFF

Reviewing a statement recently presented to the government, Mr. Rice said the association asks for "a more adequate customs tariff structure which is fair, just, reasonable, balanced and impartial and in the national interest."

but it was one in which Canada's economic fortress would stand or fall.

Specific methods of implementing it would be the revision of customs act provisions dealing with valuation of imported goods for duty purposes and re-examination and replacement, where necessary of specific rates of duty and maximum duties with more realistic rates.

The association statement had also asked "a positive and progressive policy of immigration," a gradual approach to convertibility of the pound and other currencies; policies permitting further diversification of industry to reduce vulnerability to adverse conditions in other countries; an "ever justifiable processing of materials and products to an increasing extent in Canada."

Reasons for "adequate customs duties" given by Mr. Rice included:

### WOULD BOOST JOBS

To maintain and increase employment; to develop and maintain domestic industries; to provide necessary government revenues; to offset lower foreign production costs resulting from lower foreign wage costs; to offset increased costs of distribution among Canada's comparatively sparse and widely-dispersed population.

To enable Canadian manufacturers, through a greatly-expanded market, to secure lower costs of production by means of mass-pro-

duction methods, assembly-line operations and research and development programs;

To offset substantial changes in the values of foreign currencies; to discourage the dumping or unloading of foreign goods on the Canadian market; to promote diversification through a multiplicity and variety of industries and job opportunities;

To establish and maintain essential domestic sources of supply needed in times of peace as well as war; to encourage new capital investment in productive enterprises; to prevent foreign domination of the Canadian market.

### HOLD FALSE IDEAS

Canada, said Mr. Rice, had changed from a farming to an industrial country, but some misconceptions remained. Topping the list of misconceptions was the idea that Canada was nothing more than a producer of raw materials to feed the mills and factories of outside nations.

"In the modern picture nothing could be further from the truth," said Mr. Rice.

In 1901 five Canadian workers were engaged in agriculture to every three engaged in manufacturing and as late as 1930 the proportion was much the same. Today the proportions were reversed, with manufacturing employees outnumbering agricultural workers 13 to eight.

This year, Mr. Rice stated, Canadian manufacturers have planned a capital investment program of \$817,000,000.
