quire a minimum of nursing care. "These host-type units," he said, would be central locations so that tenants would not be far removed from relatives and friends.

Mr. Currie, who is in charge of the project, said that the provincial government will finance a portion of the project. The housing project will be financed by a provincial government grant and a 40-year mortgage loan with a low interest rate from the federal government, according to Mr. Wedge. He said "the corporation believes that the proposed housing accommodation will take care of most of the aged in the province who require modern comfortable accommodation at low rental."

The Soutis and Tignish projects will serve as a basis on which the corporation will be uniform throughout the province. "Regulations are being drawn up by a committee of the corporation," Mr. Wedge said, "which will outline the terms and conditions of the project and of priority under which this type of accommodation can be obtained."

Mr. Wedge said the corporation feels that the Charlottetown area will require 50 self-contained units, Summerside will need 25 and the rest of the province will need about 125.

St. Eleanors New Water System Inaugurated By Premier Shaw

A spanking new water system for the village of St. Eleanors was officially opened yesterday afternoon when Premier W. A. Shaw threw the switch to activate the pump.

The pumping system and a locally formed body of the Summerside-St. Eleanors highway on a property formerly owned by Norman Johnston.

A brief ceremony marking the inauguration of the new system was held at the pumping station in the village of St. Eleanors, Summerside Town Councilors and members of the St. Eleanors Water Commission in attendance.

Mr. Canon, president of the St. Eleanors village commissioners presided and in his remarks noted that the village was very pleased with the project. He said the sewerage system installed some time ago proved very satisfactory and the water system is expected to be equally favorable.

ROOM FOR EXPANSION
Mr. Canon said about 5.6 miles of water mains had been laid and there are "still lots of room for expansion". He termed St. Eleanors "the heart of Canada's garden province."

Dr. Robert MacNeill, provincial health minister, stated that he thought St. Eleanors was "one of the fastest growing villages on the Island. He referred to its people as "very progressive".

Dr. MacNeill complimented the village commissioners for their co-operation which they have given him during the past three years.

Dr. Orville Phillips, M.P., commented on the fine job done by the contractors in the construction of the complete system. He said the village people deserve a great deal of credit for undertaking the water system project.

Grain Claims Now Top 900

More than 900 farmers have applied for compensation on approximately 9,000 acres of used Thursday from S. C. Wright, deputy minister of agriculture. Slightly more than the 900 have filed claims under the time deadlines set in the department of agriculture, and 50 others have been late in mailing their applications. These will be held until the survey of the claims received in time has been completed, it was revealed.

of Education Dr. George Dewar. The minister termed the school "a tremendous achievement" and the essential parts are now in operation and a large class of grade nine students have started training. By next year, Dr. Dewar said, about 500 students could be enrolled.

He complimented the architect, Mr. Pickard, and the teaching staff of the school. "It is increasingly difficult for the untrained people to hold jobs now," said Dr. Dewar and he felt the school would have a great impact on Prince County.

Dr. Hubert MacNeill, provincial health minister, introduced Dr. Orville Phillips, M.P., during which Dr. MacNeill termed the school "a great part of our educational system. He said students taking vocational training at the school spend 50 percent of their time in classwork, studying arts and languages.

Dr. Phillips said the federal government has always been with chronic unemployment, and in realizing this fact, stated they would pay 75 percent of the cost of construction of the school. "This is a bright day in the lives of our future citizens," remarked Dr. Phillips. He said by learning trades and courses, the students would be preparing their lives for a better future and a better Canada.
