"Newk" Happy About Award

NEW YORK (AP) — Don Newcombe, Brooklyn's ace pitcher, has been voted the National League's most valuable player in 1956 and the controversial righthander is as happy about it as if he had beaten the New York Yankees in a world series game.

"Next to the letter I received from the president, this is the greatest thing that ever happened to me in baseball," Big Newk said upon hearing the news that a committee of 24 members of the Baseball Writers Association had given him eight first place votes and a total of 223.

Newcombe was referring to the encouraging letter he received from President Eisenhower while he was in Japan last month, expressing sympathy over his world series failures against the Yankees last October.

MAKES UP FOR DRUBBINGS
"This will certainly give me a lot more confidence in myself after the batting around I took in the world series," the 30-year-old Newcombe said. "And it also may snow under some of those wise-cracks about my not being able to win the big ones . . . I hope."

The MVP award, first given to a pitcher since Jim Konstanty of

the Philadelphia Phillies won the honor in 1950, recompensed somewhat for the anguish of two successive world series drubbings by the Yankees and Don's subsequent failures in Hawaii and Japan.

Although Big Newk won 27 games and lost only seven for the highest winning total of any Dodger pitcher since Dizzy Vance won 28 in 1924, he just managed to edge out his mound mate, Sal Maglie, for top honors. The 39-year-old Maglie, who won 13 games after joining the Brooklyn team in mid-May, received four first place votes and 183 points to finish second in the voting.

AARON THIRD
Henry Aaron, Milwaukee's fine young outfielder who won the league's batting crown with a mark of .328, finished third with 146 points although he did not receive a single first place vote. Warren Spahn, the Braves' veteran southpaw star who won 20 for the seventh time, placed fourth with one first place vote and 126 points.

Brooklyn's Junior Gilliam beat out Cincinnati's star shortstop, Roy McMillan, for fifth spot, 103 points to McMillan's 97. Gilliam drew four first place votes to McMillan's three.

And no power on earth can make one goal equal 1/2 point more than you can say that 1 equals 2. The same thing goes for assists. Let's hope that no one will donate any trophies for high man in goals or high man in assists.

Our Summerside Aces have won one game and lost three for .250 average. We've got to watch the averages this year for they will decide the four teams to enter play-offs at the end of the season. Let them say it with body slams and poke checks, and if they're not up there in the scoring race, let's not forget their contribution to the cause.

Sometimes these goals and assists do receive too much attention. A man who scores three goals, and then by slip-ups allows three goals to be scored against his team, isn't helping much. Yes people will rave about the hot tricks and little will be said concerning the defensive lapses. Preventing a goal is as good as scoring one anytime.

Yes, there will have to be close harmony to make that quartet. And there will be no room for those temperamental chaps who have to have everything their way or they will go home to father. Right now the Aces have one or two more forwards than they can fit into three lines. May the best players win the coveted spots, and may all be good enough

Merrill Pineau Leading Scorer

Shifty centremen Merrill Pineau of the Basildon Youth Club is top scorer in the Island Hockey League after a little more than a week of play, according to official statistics.

Pineau has played only two games but he has racked up 6 goals and 4 assists for a total of 10 points. Tied for second are Montague's speedy centremen Bill Hughes and Linemate Apps Arsenault with 9 points each.

Hughes is tied with Pineau in the leadership for goals with 6.

A SLAUGHTER ON RECORDS

Coach Predicts US Will Cleanup In Track Events

MELBOURNE (CP)—One of the world's greatest track and field coaches predicted Wednesday that the United States will make a virtual cleanup in that section of the 1956 Olympic Games and that the slaughter on records will be amazing.

Frank Stampfl, 43-year-old Austrian-born physical education director at the University of Melbourne, gave a final look at the entries as the athletes tapered off their training and handicapped 21 events for The Canadian Press.

He confined his handicapping to the men's teams.

He picked United States stars to win 14, seven of them track and four field. His next best rankings were three each for Great Britain and Russia. He forecast all three of Britain's wins in track competition; one in track for Russia and two in field. He didn't give Canada a look.

Four other countries were predicted by Stampfl to take gold medals in field events only—Australia, Hungary, Italy and Poland.

COULDN'T RATE CANADA

Stampfl has been coaching track and field stars for 20 years. He is the man who coached Dr. Roger Bannister when the famous British runner became the man first to crack the four-minute mile.

The best Stampfl could see for Canada was a sixth-place finish in the 400-metre run for Terry Toibacco of Cumberland, B.C. Canada's relay teams, at 400 and 1,600 metres, were given a bare outside chance to get by the preliminaries and make the finals.

Stampfl predicted flatly that every Olympic record in track and field will be wiped out except the broad jump. He hedged only

slightly on the sprints, saying these records may withstand the assault if head winds hold back the runners.

Against the competition Canadians will have to face, he said the boys from Canada "haven't a ghost of a chance to win an Olympic medal."

It will be scarcely a contest for Parry O'Brien of the United States in the shot put, said Stampfl, and the same holds for the American teams in the 400 and 1,600-metre relays.

PICKS AMERICANS

His call for the 100-metre sprint is Ira Murchison, Thane Baker and Bobby Morrow—all Americans. He differs from other experts in picking Murchison over Morrow and even gave second place choice to Baker.

Andy Stanfield, Baker and Morrow are picked by Stampfl in that order for the 200-metre sprint, followed by Ardalion Ignatyev of

Russia.

Brian Hewson of Britain gets the call over Hungary's Laszlo Taborn in the 500-metre run, with Ken Wood of Britain third.

Stampfl can see no one but the great Chris Chataway of Britain in the 5,000-metre run. He gives second choice to Britain's Gordon Pirie and rates Russia's Vladimir Kuts third.

Stampfl's pick in this order, for the high jump: Charlie Porter, Australia; Charlie Dumas, U.S.; Igor Kashkarov, Russia; Bengt Nilsson, Sweden.

"Dumas is the only man in 20 beyond seven feet but I don't think he can do it this time," he said. Stampfl rates Bob Richards of the United States second to teammate James Graham in the pole vault, despite Richards' victory in the 1952 games. "There'll be no 15-footer this time," said Stampfl, rating two Russians—Vitaliy Cherenobay and Pyotr Denisenko—behind the Americans.

BATTLE FOR FIRST

Parkdale-B.Y.C. Clash Tonight
