### Soon Be Able To See Atom

LONDON (Reuters) — It may soon be possible to see a single atom under the microscope, the British Association for the Advancement of Science was told here Wednesday.

Dr. V. E. Coslett, of the Cavendish laboratory, at Cambridge University, told the physics section of the association that the rapid development of the microscope, especially since the end of the Second World War, has made it possible to reach into the domain of molecules composed of no more than 100 atoms.

Although the technical difficulties are formidable, Coslett said it is theoretically possible to observe at least the larger atoms singly.

### Old Painting Proves Valuable

PAMPLONA, Spain (AP) — An old painting purchased by a collector for only \$38.46 has been identified by experts as a work by Bartolome Esteban Murillo, famous 17th century Spanish artist.

The painting appeared dirty and undistinguished when Maximo Bendres picked it up a year ago in a curio shop for 1,300 pesetas. Now the canvas has been restored and identified. Bendres has turned down offers of more than 300,000 pesetas (7,692).

The canvas—about 14 inches by 11—shows Saint Felix of Cantalejo receiving a piece of bread from a child supposed to represent Jesus.

### JULY WAGES HIGHER

OTTAWA (CP)—Average weekly wages in industrial employment rose to \$60.87 July 1, up from \$60.76 a month earlier and \$58.96 a year earlier. The bureau of statistics also reported Thursday the index of industrial employment, based on 1949 equalling 100, increased to 114.9 July 1 an advance of 2.9 per cent in the previous month.
