BRITAIN'S RESOLVE.

Will Not Tolerate French Centres of Influence in Soudan.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—The London correspondent of the Sun says: The understanding with Germany seems to relate to the entire African continent and not only to the reversion of a Portuguese colony. Most of the German press, in pursuance of the mutual dislike existing between the Berlin and London newspapers, candidly avow that they have been printing articles urging the French to insist upon the retention of Fashoda, but the Kolnische Zeitung prints today this communication: "Taking account of the relative number of the forces in the Soudan as well as the general situation there, France can hardly expect to uphold her claim to the possession of Fashoda. England is firmly resolved not to tolerate French centres of influence in the Soudan under any circumstances."

"The difficulty of bringing about an understanding mainly consists of the question how to find a way out without hurting French susceptibilities, a way which would offer compensations where with the French Government could, to the outside public at any rate, declare itself satisfied."

Dr. W. S. Leys, state secretary of the South African republic, has been in Berlin this week, in behalf of the Transvaal, but returned to Hague without seeing Emperor William. In fact his reception in the German capital was most unfriendly. He did not even see Herr Von Bulow, the foreign minister, but his substitute is reported to have said to Dr Leys in behalf of his majesty: "I must express to you the Emperor's urgent wish that you and your government cease agitating in the German newspapers against the Anglo-German agreement."

After this Englishman would not be surprised at any extension of Anglo-German political operation.

DEATH OF AN ISLANDER

(Norwich, Conn., Post, Sept. 30.)

Daniel Shaw died Tuesday at his home No 69 Twelfth street, at the age of 71 after an illness of 10 days, with pneumonia. He was born in Prince Edward Island, December 25, 1827.

In 1853 he came to Greenville from Wareham, Mass., and entered the employ of the Mowry Machine Company. Up to the breaking out of the Civil War he enlisted in Company A, Eighth regiment Connecticut infantry, where he served three years. He was discharged at Harper's Ferry, Va., on the 27th day of June 1865. On his return to Norwich he re-entered the employ of the Mowry Machine Company and remained with them until the company went out of business. He entered the employ of the Norwich Bleaching, Dyeing and printing company, 19 years ago and worked there until his death. The deceased was a member of Sedgewick Post, No 1, G. A. R., and for 39 years was a member of the Third Baptist church.

Mr. Shaw was thrice married. His first wife was Abbie Jane Maples, a sister of Frank T. Maples, of this city. Her sad demise came soon after their marriage and several years afterward he was wedded to Kate Kendall, a sister of the late Increase W. Carpenter. Two children were born to them, Charles, of Passaic, N. J., and Joseph, of Brooklyn, N. Y., who survive their father. Twenty seven years ago he married Caroline Husband, of England, who with seven children, Mrs John Eaton of Groton, John William, Harold and George of Norwich, and Misses Annie and Mamie survive him. He is also survived by four brothers, Neal Shaw, of Peabody, Mass., Alexander and John Shaw, and Mrs William Hudson, of Prince Edward Island and Edwin C. Shaw, of Philadelphia.

Mr. Shaw was a man of fine nature, who loved his home and family and found the greatest of pleasure in his home circle. As a soldier he was fearless and brave and as a friend he was prized highly. His life was an exemplary one and he leaves a grief-stricken family and legion of friends.

Funeral services will be held at the Third Baptist Church at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Sedgewick Post will meet at their headquarters at 1 o'clock to attend the funeral.

A PAINTER'S CONSCIENCE

In the course of some reminiscences of Sir Edward Burne-Jones a correspondent of The Westminster Gazette remarks: Those who are not "offended" by the paradoxes of Charles Lamb would have delighted in Burne-Jones' play of humor and imagination. Let me justify my reference to Charles Lamb.

I once returned to Burne-Jones some books which he had lent me 30 years before, writing to him to the effect that if it was base to keep borrowed books so long it was heroic to return them after such long possession as might well breed the sense of ownership. In reply he said:

"The return of those books has simply staggered me. It has also pained me, for it seems to raise the standard of morality in these matters and perhaps to sting the susceptible consciences of book borrowers. I have many borrowed books on my shelves. I would rather the owners should die than that I should have to think about these things and return them. I have two costly volumes that were lent to me before that little incident of ours, which, you may remember, was in Red Lion square. I hope the owner is no more, for I simply will not give them up. And you have made me uneasy and have helped to turn an amiable rascal into a confirmed villain. Your affectionate NED."

Slang Puzzled Him.

Edouard Remenyi, the great violinist, used to say that some of the hardest studying he ever did in his life began after an experience he had in Detroit.

"On my first tour of this country," he delighted in telling, "I worked unceasingly to acquire a knowledge of the language and got on fairly well. But the slang that I found so prevalent baffled me more than anything else. I gave a performance in Detroit one night and met with a reception that warmed my heart toward her people. 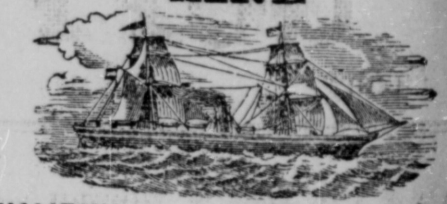
