## Australian Wins British Amateur Golf Tourney

MURFIELD, Scotland, (CP)—Doug Bachli, 32-year-old Australian saloon keeper, won the British amateur golf championship Saturday with a 2-and-1 victory over Bill Campbell of Huntington, W. Va.

The long-hitting American, favored to win the 36-hole final against the little-known Aussie, wasted four strokes in two sand traps with the wrong club to provide the margin.

The steady, non-smoking teetotaler from Rosebud, Victoria, playing steady golf, overcame one-hole deficits on the 5th, 17th, 19th and 32nd, won the next two holes and halved the 35th to take the title.

The two holes which caused the six-foot-three blonde American the most trouble were the 17th and the 33rd.

## English Woman First To Run 5-Minute Mile

BIRMINGHAM, England, (Reuters)—Diane Leather of Birmingham became the first woman to run a mile in less than five minutes, when she clocked four minutes, 59.6 seconds here Saturday.

Miss Leather, 22-year-old Birmingham University micro-analyst, accomplished her feat 23 days after Roger Bannister, British medical student, ran the mile in 3 minutes, 59.4 seconds at Oxford, England.

Miss Leather, who was taking part in the Midland women's athletic championships here, decided to compete in the race only half an hour before the start.

Mile events for women are not internationally recognized. Officials consider the distance too far for women and consider it a "freak" event.

Although few women run the race, Miss Leather's time will be ratified in due course as the best performance ever by a woman over this distance.
