A FEW POINTS TO BE NOTED.

The report of the Premier's taxation speech, published at length in THE EXAMINER, will prepare the public mind for the Premier's plan of campaign in respect to taxation, and enable the people, a little later in the season, to compare his words with his acts.

There is one fact, twice repeated in the Premier's speech, which will be noted with pleasure by all Liberal-Conservatives: the fact that Senator Ferguson and Mr. Blake "plainly" told the people that the time was come when taxation was in evidence.

There is another point to be noted with pleasure, and that is the Premier's alleged determination to continue the application of the pruning knife to the public service. The necessity of the treasury requires that all useless branches shall be lopped off.

There is no money with which to pay doleful and palatial hangings. We agree with the Premier that good men who are required in the public service—ought to receive good salaries. The Premier's statement that he will cut down the salary of the Attorney-General sounds heroic.
