

# Property Trade Paves Way For Legion Home

A three-way property transaction by the Summerside Town Council last evening cleared the way for the construction of a new \$100,000.00 Canadian Legion Home at the corner of Cedar and Notre Dame Streets.

The council agreed to sell the Legion about five acres bordering on the Green Road and the Pope Road, from land commonly known as the "old airport" property. The Legion in turn will exchange this property with the Provincial Department of Highways for their Summerside property on which the Government Garage is located. This property is in the area bounded on three sides by Notre Dame, Cedar, and Court Streets, with the Curling Rink and Court House occupying the remainder of the space in the block.

The Government Garage would be moved outside the town to the new property, providing the Department of Highways with more space, and enabling the Legion to proceed with plans to construct a new and larger Legion Home, where ample parking space could be provided.

In a letter to the council, the Legion noted that the Summerside Sea Cadets and Air Cadets had been asked to find new quarters, and said that the Legion would consider housing both corps in the proposed new home. The letter said also that they hoped to have a banquet hall large enough to seat about 500 persons. The property transaction dealt with last night had the unanimous approval of all councillors.

The town council also gave its support for the adoption of Daylight Saving Time, and favoured an amendment to the Uniform Time Act to permit Daylight Saving Time on a uniform basis by the government for an accepted annual period.

A town by-law governing building areas and repairs to buildings was amended in part so that the charges for building or altering of estimated values was lowered from \$5 to 1, so that the section 9 of the by-law now reads in part, "and one dollar additional for each one thousand dollars or fraction thereof in excess of fifty thousand dollars."

Councillor Dr. H.E. Clark, chairman of the electric light department, reported that the peak load for the year 1958 reached 2680 kw at 5:30 on the night of Monday, December 22nd.

He said that meters now being read will be billed on the new rate schedule which became effective on January 1st. He said

that under the new rates, all two wire customers over 30 kw will enjoy lower costs, while those under 30 kw will be a little higher than previously, but he said there were very few of these, and he had been told that a test set could use that much by itself in a month. Those having three wire services will benefit by lower rates when their power use exceeds 42 kw per month, and that there were very few who did not normally use more than this.

Councillor Robert Dewar, chairman of the water and sewerage committee, reviewed the events which led to installation of a new pump head which restored the Harvard Street well to service at noon yesterday after two breakdowns last week which had made the pump inoperative.

Councillor Dewar expressed appreciation to the pump manufacturers, and the various airways officials who co-operated fully to deliver the essential pump head from California to Summerside in less than 48 hours.

PADLOCK REGULATIONS After his report on this matter Councillor Dewar announced a new padlock regulation in regard to the Harvard Street pump house.

He said that he is going to change the lock on the pump house this morning and that only he and Alfred Groom, a senior employee of the water department, will have keys to the pump house. Councillor Dewar said that he had been told that a piece of cloth which he had had removed from within the motor which powers the pump house had also been located at the Town Hall so that civic officials and members of the electric light department could enter the building for electrical maintenance, reading of electric and water meters, or for any other necessary reason.

Councillor Dewar said that in 1952 the town was using about 500,000 gallons of water daily, and although pumping capacity is less now than at that time, the town today is using upwards of a million gallons of water each day.

Three of the five wells are operating continuously, and a fourth, inactive since last May because of salt water contamination, had to be pressed into service in the emergency last week, and it had flooded the system with salt water which had resulted in many complaints.

MORE WATER PLANNED He said it was the intention of the water and sewerage committee to present a resolution to

the council in the very near future in regard to increasing the water supply within the town, and noted that it would be three months at the earliest before a new well could be put into production.

The council appeared to be in agreement on the need for improving the water supply, and Mayor Currie noted that when engineering services had commenced the electrical and water and sewerage survey for the town priority had to be given at that time to the electric light department. Some of their preliminary work on the water and sewerage department, however had resulted in drilling the well at the electric light plant, Mayor Currie said, and that now it remained only to decide the type of pump to go in this well, and that Mr. Kay was ready to resume the work on the town's water problems.

Mayor Currie expressed assurance that the council would be fully co-operative on action to have the water pumping capacity increased at the earliest possible time.

## Job Situation In Prince Co. Is Brighter

SUMMERSIDE - Unemployment in Prince County has shown a drop in 1959 with 204 less people out of work than was the case in the same period in 1958, according to figures compiled by the local National Employment Office.

As of January 3rd there were 1,949 persons registered for employment - 1,537 men and 382

women. In the same period last year there were 1,154 persons registered.

However, the January figure shows an increase over that of a month ago when 1,108 were out of work.

Neither total includes registrations of fishermen which at present have reached the 964 mark and 43 women.

Earl Cannon, manager of the Summerside office, said yesterday the over-all picture is brighter than it appears because a major problem on the Island this year is the increased work force.

He said fewer jobs available in the industrial areas of Canada have caused Islanders to return home and fewer to leave there by giving the Island more men looking for employment.

Mr. Cannon also said that the employment level would be substantially higher but for the cold weather that curtailed work on many construction projects until spring.

## Call Tenders For Hangars

SUMMERSIDE - Tenders have been called for completion of the new cantilever hangar to be built at the RCAF Station.

The tender for the steel work of the structure that will house the new Argus aircraft has already been awarded Robb Engineering Ltd. of Amherst and tenders for the concrete foundation were called by Defence Construction Limited last week.

The present tender will be for the work remaining after the foundation is laid and the steel erected.

The project will cost in excess of \$3 million.

## Loggers Claim Victory Near
