CONTRACT BRIDGE

LOST ADVANTAGE
SOUTH was given a reprieve from certain defeat in the following hand—but he didn't appreciate his good fortune.

South dealer.
East-West vulnerable.

♠ A 7 4	♠ K J 10
♥ J 5	♥ 9
♦ A Q J 9	♦ A 6 4
♣ K J 8 8	♣ K 4 3 2

The bidding:
South West North East
Pass Pass 1♦ Pass
1♥ Pass 1♠ Pass
2NT Pass 3NT Double
Pass Pass

North, according to his own subsequent explanation, had two reasons for putting in the psychic spade bid in the second round; to invite some voluntary action from his partner at a low level, and to inhibit a spade lead against the eventual contract. Not vulnerable, North was willing to risk being dropped at one spade, because if South's hand was so weak that he could not make another bid, there obviously could not be a game. As for the possibility that South would innocently give a strong raise for spades—North felt that he had a good enough general hand to compensate for his short spade suit.

East intended his double of three notrump as a demand for a spade opening, but West evidently thought otherwise and led his top diamond. Declarer put in the nine from dummy—and East quickly repaired his fences. Winning with the diamond king, he shifted to spades. South could run only four clubs, three diamonds and the spade ace, and the moment he tried for a heart trick, East put up the ace and cashed his spades to defeat the contract.

It is quite possible that South would have met defeat no matter how he maneuvered, but a far shrewder line of play was to put up the diamond ace at Trick 1 and then try to steal a heart trick. It would take a very good defender in East's position to play the ace of hearts when the jack was led from dummy for an apparent finesse, and if East did not play the ace, South could go right up with the heart king. Then, with that trick home, he could knock out the diamond king.
