Junior Red Cross Receives Overseas Project Replies

Replies to the International Correspondence Project initiated two years ago by eight of the provincial Junior Red Cross branches were received at local J.R.C. headquarters this summer. The albums shown in the above photo were sent to the Island groups in return for similar projects forwarded by the Island Students. Their contents, which include photos, drawings, and samples of various native handicrafts, depict many aspects of the life and customs of the lands in which they originated. They will be on display at the Charlottetown J.R.C. headquarters for the next few days. These albums will shortly be despatched to their corresponding Island branches: to Anglo Russia from India; to Howlan from Ireland; to Orwell from Scotland; to Murray River from Thailand; to White Sands from Switzerland; to Kinkora Convent from Italy; to York from Ireland to Fredericton from Australia. Miss Marie Bowness, Island Director of Junior Red Cross, points to samples of Venetian lace and embroidery placed in the Italian album by pupils of Grade three. The Director stated that this project gives Island boys and girls who are members of the Junior Red Cross, "a wonderful opportunity of becoming ambassadors of friendship and goodwill." Referring to this year's J.R.C. enrollment Miss Bowness said that to date 250 branches had enrolled. Of these, 60 had indicated their intention to take part in the International Correspondence Project this year, she added. "Through this group project," Miss Bowness declared, "Juniors are able to see the many ways in which they are like children in other lands, too, they learn to understand and enjoy the many national differences. This activity, conducted as a class project, provides motivation for, and vitality to, social studies, art, arithmetic, composition and all other related subjects." Prices Trouble U.K. Gov't

By FRASER WIGTON LONDON (Reuters) - The Conservative government will face strong protests over the mounting cost of living from its own supporters at their annual conference at Brighton starting Oct. 10. The conference agenda, issued Wednesday, contains 70 resolutions on prices, some of them highly critical of Prime Minister Macmillan's administration. Bridgewater (Somerset County) Conservatives say the government has "surrendered" to an inflationary situation. Ben-kenham (Kent) talks of the government's "inability" to stem it. Running through other resolutions is an urgent call for stronger action to control the cost of living. ALLEGES INEFFICIENCY

Research Institute Suggests That Senate Be Unchanged

TORONTO (CP) - The Citizens Research Institute of Canada suggested Wednesday in a statement on the Senate's future that "the most reasonable course would be to leave the Canadian Senate in its present inefficient state." After considering in detail various proposals to reform or modify the Canadian upper house and an alternative suggestion it be abolished, the institute concluded: "At first glance the Senate, as it now is constituted, must be a source of disturbance in our political consciousness, which demands that every institution must serve a purpose. But when the factors are considered it will be seen that mere existence of the Senate does indeed fulfill a function: Namely, towards the preservation of harmony among the provinces. "To encourage the Senate to become an active force in our legislative process would be to risk the dangers attendant upon
